

Siege the 10th Infant. The Leech, Man of War was sent to the River to destroy the French Frigate, which she did, and immediately sunk. At the Time of the Siege a Fire broke out by Accident and consumed a great Number of Houses.

An Account of the March and other Transactions of the French Army under the Command of the Chevalier de Levy, from the 18th of April, 1760.

ON the 17th of April we left Montreal, under the Command of Monsieur Levy, with the following Battalions of Regulars, Canadians and Indians.

One Battalion of the Queen's Regiment,	500	Men.

In all ten Battalions; but as they were defective, the Whole is supposed to have amounted to 4500 Regulars, besides 6000 Canadians, of which 200 were mounted, and formed a Body of Horse, 250 Indians of the Iroquois and other Nations. Our Provisions, Ammunition, and heaviest Baggage were carried down in six Frigates, from 44 to 26 Guns, who had under their Convoy a great Number of Schooners, Batoes, and other Small Craft for the Army. We had nine Days March from Montreal to Carouge, and the 10th Day arrived on the Plains of Abraham, three Leagues from Quebec; 11 Companies of Grenadiers advanced while the rest of the Army were posted in the Houses on each Side of the Road leading from Carouge to Quebec; at about Half a League Distance we met an advanced Party of the English, with whom we had three or four distant Skirmishes, in their Retreat to the Town. The 28th, about Nine in the Morning, we perceived the Body of the English Garrison in Motion, beating the General, at Ten we formed the Regiment of Rouffillon and Laflaire in the Center, the Regiments of Guienne, Bayard's and Queen's on the Right, and the Regiments of Languedoc, Berry, and the Grenadiers on the Left, we formed a Line three deep, and in the Intervals of the Regulars we posted the Canadians. The Battalions of Marine, with the Indians, were advantageously posted at the Entrance of a Wood: The English advanced with great Resolution, with their Field Pieces in Front, and their first Impression was so violent as to oblige our Center to give Way; but we soon recovered our Disorders, and continued returning the Compliment of their Fire: Our Wings at the same Time advanced and formed a Simicircle upon the Enemy's Flanks, whereupon they thought proper to return into the Town, leaving us the Field, their Artillery, and above 2000 Entrenching Tools. In this Action Monsieur Beau La Mare commanded on the Right, Monsieur Dumas in the Center, and the Chevalier Levy on the Left. We opened Ground that Evening, and continued our Work till the 5th of May, when we began to batter the Walls with 12 Iron Pieces of 12 Pounders, which continued until the Arrival of the Vanguard, which Monsieur Levy imagining to be only the Foremost of a large Reinforcement, raised the Siege, after nailing up some of his battering Cannon, and leaving the heaviest of his Baggage behind, the Artillery taken from the English having been sent up the River in one of the Ships. I compute in the Action on the 28th of April our Loss about 1800 killed and wounded. When we left Montreal it was in a weak State of Defence, not above ten Pieces of indifferent Cannon mounted on the Walls. The Garrison 2000 Men, mostly Canadians; but there does not appear any Scarcity of Provisions.

[This is for the French Account.]

On Saturday last came to Town, from Montreal, one of the Officers taken Prisoner by the French in the Battle near Quebec, on the 28th of April last: He left Montreal 16 Days ago, and informs that all the Officers which were taken Prisoners in that Battle, except Colonel Young, have been discharged upon their Parole of Honour, and were conducted by a Flag of Truce to Crown-Point, and that while they were with the Enemy they were treated by Monsieur Vaudreuil, and all the French Officers, in a very polite Manner. — That they had Bread, Fish, and Pigeons in great Plenty, but no other Provisions: — That they daily sent out Scouts in order to take a Prisoner to gain Intelligence of the Operations of our Army, but returned unsuccessful till about ten Days since, when they met with two Men near Crown-Point, one of which they killed and scalped, the other they carried to Montreal: — That all their Fields were planted before they went to attack Quebec, and since their Return, the Canadians, which composed the greatest Part of their Army, had Leave to go and take Care of the same, but ordered to appear at a Moment's Warning, with eight Days Provision, in Case of an Attack.

NEW-YORK, July 7.

Sunday the 29th of last Month, Captain Derby, in his Majesty's Ship the Devonshire, of 70 Guns, arrived off of Sandy Hook, as Convoy to four Store Ships, and a Fleet of 20 Sail of other Vessels bound to several Parts of America, from England. After seeing three of the Store Ships into the Hook, he proceeded with the other for Boston, and it is said, is bound from thence to Halifax. The next Day the three Store Ships arrived safe in the North-River. They have brought upwards of 140 Pieces of Cannon, and other warlike Stores for the Use of the several Fortresses and Garrisons in these Parts.

On board of the Devonshire also came his Majesty's Commissions, appointing his Excellency Francis Bernard, Esq; Governor of the Massachusetts-Bay, and his Excellency Thomas Boone, Esq; Governor of the Province of N. Jersey. By the Post last Night from Albany, we hear the General was in good Health, and had got within 12 Miles of Fort Stanwix.

A Letter from Albany, dated the 2d Instant, says that three or four Batoes, laden with Suttlers Goods, had been lately taken near Oswego, by the Enemy.

Tuesday the Snow Friendship, Captain Shearer, arrived here in seven Weeks from Lisbon. Four Weeks Yesterday he spoke with his Majesty's Ship Norwich, of 50 Guns, bound to this Port from England, having on board 150,000l. Sterling, for the Use of the British Troops in North-America.

PHILADELPHIA, July 10.

On Tuesday arrived here Captain Jones, in 24 Days, from Louisburg. As he came out, twelve Sail of Vessels arrived, said to be the Fleet from New-York. They were busy destroying the Werks there, having above 1000 Men at Work

on them, and it was thought it would take six Weeks to complete it from the Time Captain Jones sailed.

Sunday last Capt. James Reith, in the Brigantine *Martha*, arrived here from Antigua, who informs that there is now in the West-India 20 or 21 Sail of English Men of War of the Line.

The same Day arrived in South River, the Ship *Jenny of Liverpool*, Capt. John Wilkinson, with upwards of 300 choice healthy Slaves. She left the Coast of Angola on the 4th of March; and on the 29th of April, 60 Leagues to the Eastward of Barbados, was attacked by a French Privateer Sloop of 14 Guns, and full of Men, which was received so warmly that she was twice beat off; however, she made a third Attempt, by coming along Side with Stunk-pots, &c. in order to Board, but was obliged to sheer off again. The *Jenny* had 24 Men and Boys, and a few small Carriage Guns, and the Captain arm'd 50 of the Slaves, who all behaved well, and laid down their Arms as soon as the Engagement was over. One of the Crew was mortally wounded, and died next Day, and one of the Negroes was kill'd, and several slightly wounded. The Enemy's Loss was considerable.

We hear from Cecil County, that Capt. Henry Ward, one of the Representatives for that County, lately died there of the Small-Pox.

And last Sunday Evening, in Charles County, died Capt. Arthur Lee, one of the Representatives for that County.

This Town is now almost clear of the Small-Pox; and 'tis probable, will be quite clear in a Fortnight, or two.
