### ROCKVILLE.

A bronze tablet erected in the circuit court room here in memory of Lieut. Col. Gustavus W. Dorsey, who was the commanding officer of the First Maryland cavalry, Confederate army, was unveiled Saturday afternoon in the presence of a large gathering.

The tablet bears this inscription: "To commemorate the valor and efficiency as a soldier and the personal worth as a citizen of Gustavus W. Dorsey, lieutenant colonel, commanding the First Maryland cavalry, C. S. A., born 1832, died 1911, this tablet is erected by the survivors and the daughters and sons of the deceased soldiers of his command."

Mrs. Benjamin P. Whalen, of Bethesda, introduced Capt. Samuel Riggs, of Rockville, a veteran of the Spanish-American war and a Son of the Confederacy, as presiding officer. Capt. Riggs concluded his remarks by introducing Matthew Page Andrews, of Baltimore, a historian, who delivered the principal address. The veil was drawn by Miss Lucy Dorsey, of Baltimore, a cousin of Col. Dorsey.

Following a conference here with Prof. W. R. Ballard, landscape specialist of the University of Maryland, the committee, headed by Mrs. S. J. Goode, decided to plant trees along both sides of the Rockville-Gaithersburg pike for about 2 miles at the Rockville end. The trees will be furnished free of cost by the State forestry department.

Miss Helen Froleigh, formerly a member of the faculty of Hampton Institute, at Hampton, Va., died yesterday at Waverly sanitarium at Montrose, 36 years old. The funeral will take place at 10 p. m. tomorrow from Pumphrey's chapel, Rockville. Rev. Millard F. Minnick, rector of Christ Episcopal Church, Rockville, will conduct the services.
