A negro slave, the property of Capt. PRARCE, of this town, was hung last Thursday for attempting to commit an outrage on the person of a Miss. PRICE, daughter of JOHN V. PRICE, of Cecilton. The young lady had been out riding; was returning, and arriving at a pair of bars where the negro was standing, requested him to take them down. Instead of complying, he dragged her from her horse and attempted to accomplish his base design. She struggled bravely, and bit his fingers so severely, that he desisted from his purpose.—The residents of Cecilton upon hearing of the outrage, caught the negro and hung him to the nearest tree.
