

TRAGEDY IN INDIANA.—The Richmond,

Mr. Burch was, a few years ago, a merchant in Hillsboro, and a man of some forty years of age. His family consisted of his wife and an only son, who is now a soldier in the Nineteenth Indiana regiment. It had been observed by his neighbors for some months past that he was frequently away from home several weeks at a time, giving various pretenses as the cause. Some weeks since, Mrs. Burch fell sick in her husband's absence and had a physician called, who left a preing various pretenses as the cause. The same evening her husband arrived at home and took charge of the remedies left by the physician. It was noticed, however, by the nurse, that the powders being administered by Burch were white instead of dark colored, such as the physician had left, and of which the nurse had commenced giving the woman before the husband's arrival. On the return of the physician he found the patient suffering from very different causes than he had observed at his previous visit, and proposed, as the symptoms were of the most alarming nature, to have another physician immediately called, but Burch declined having anything further done, and the woman soon died. Another incident occurred at this time which at once aroused the suspicions of those who were present, and which finally led to a legal examination of the matter. Immediately after the death of Mrs. Burch, her husband dispatched a man to Winchester to purchase the patched a man to Winchester to purchase the necessary burial clothes, &c., for the occasion, and also handed a sealed but unindorsed letter to the messenger with verbal instructions to deliver it to a certain woman, a stranger, whom he supposed would be found at the hotel in Winchester. The man called at the place as directed and found a woman who had just arrived there, who claimed to be the wife of Mr. Calvin Burch. and found a woman who had just arrived there, who claimed to be the wife of Mr. Calvin Burch. The letter was opened and was found to be very brief, merely communicating the fact of the woman's death, and enjoined the necessity, on the part of the new comer, of "keeping civil till the dead woman was put away." The strange lady, however, remained at a neighbor's house until after the funeral. On returning from the burial, Burch called at the neighbor's and took the woman home with him where she remained during that night. Suspicion growing stronger in consequence of this circumstance, Burch was arrested the next morning and lodged in jail. At a preliminary investigation of the women referred to, she testified that she had been a resident of Dayton, Ohio; that she had been married to Mr. B. sometime in December last, and that he had stated to her that he had never been married, although he had a woman keeping house for him that some people supposed to be his wife, but that she was really his aunt or some other relation, and they had never been married, etc. The Prosecuting Attorney was in Richmond on Tuesday before last, on his way to Cincinnati, where he was taking the stomach of the deceased wife for chemical analysis, with the view of determining the nature of the poison administered. In explanation she asserted that some young man had attempted to strangle her. Again, she was found spitting blood. It was discovered that she had inflicted the wounds on her own throat, and that the blood she raised, came not from the lungs, but from her arm, whence she drew it by suction with the mouth; the "state of insensibility" was a cunning and most remarkable voluntary business.
