To the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore:

GENTLEMEN,

The Trustees for the Poor of Baltimore City and County, in obedience to the act of Assembly, passed at December session, 1818, ch. 122, present their annual report.

The following statement of money received and expended on account of the city, for twelve months, ending 30th April, 1836, the period to which the annual appropriation was calculated to extend, is respectfully submitted.

And also an estimate of the money that will be required from the city, for the year commencing on the first May, 1837, and ending 30th April, 1838.

From the amount of expenditure above stated, and the experience of the trustees, as far as they have advanced in the operations of the current year, they are of opinion, the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars will be required for the support of the poor and for contingencies for the year commencing on the first May, 1837, and ending 30th April, 1838.

The sum of \$13,794 83, arising from sales of old Alms House property, referred to in the last annual report, the trustees regret to state, has not been available as they were led to expect. Suit has been instituted for the recovery of the same, and the trustees entertain a hope of being in receipt of the money some time during the ensuing year; which sum, when received, as before stated, will be applicable, according to law, to the erection of necessary buildings for the more effectual securing and keeping to labor a certain description of paupers.

The document A, referred to in the foregoing statement of accounts, will show the articles furnished under the head of "supplies."

The table marked B, will show that there were admitted into the house during the year ending 30th April, 1836, including 28 births, 970 paupers, discharged 291, bound 14, died 235, elapsed 380, leaving 503 paupers, including those before in the house.

The table marked C, exhibits the monthly average to be 407 7-12 City paupers, and 47 8-12 strangers, the city being charged with 2-3 of the latter.

The document marked D, exhibits the articles made up or manufactured in the house by the paupers, together with the value of the same, amounting to \$2040 76.

The document marked E, exhibits the products of the farm for the year, valued at \$6589, of which sales were made to amount of \$334 71, and the remainder consumed at the establishment.

There accompanies this report an account marked F, of the medical and surgical cases in the house during the year, showing the number cured, relieved, &c.

There are also furnished documents showing the ages of the paupers, and the period of residence at the time of their admission into the house; also their places of birth, habits, &c. together with a table showing the quantity of clothing issued for the year. All of which is

VISITERS AND GOVERNORS

JAIL OF BALTIMORE COUNTY.

To the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore,

GENTLEMEN:

In obedience to the provisions of an act of the General Assembly of Maryland, passed at December session, 1831, ch. 58, the board of Visitors of the Jail of Baltimore city and county, present their annual report.

The receipts and expenditures for the year, from 26th November, 1835, to 26th November, 1836, are stated in the account of the warden herewith exhibited marked A. The document B, contains the usual statistical tables.

The daily average number of prisoners has been 111½
The whole number of persons who have been confined during the year, - - - - - 1927

The number of days spent in prison, - - - - - 40,733

The whole expense of the Jail including necessary repairs, - - - - - \$9,096 08

The proportion of this expense incurred on account of Baltimore city exclusive of the county, - - - 6,831 29

To pay which there has been used the

city's proportion of fees received at the Jail, \$3,183 14

Monies received from licenses to retailers of spirituous liquors, - - - - - 934 96

Leaving the actual demand to be met by monies collected from taxes on the assessable property of the city, - - - - - 2,713 19

We have drawn from the city Register rather more than this amount, and have now on hand an unexpended balance of \$801 56. We estimate that \$3,000, should be included in the levy for Baltimore city's proportion of the expenses of the Jail for the year commencing the 26th November, 1836.
