ANNAPOLIS.
On Saturday last one *Whitefield* (a Relation of
the Rev. *George Whitefield*), a Sailor belonging to
Capt. *Spencers*, was drowned in *Patuxent*. He was
on Shore, and attempting to give a Spring into the
Boat by the Help of an Oar, happened to pitch it
in deep Water, so that he fell in; and notwith-
standing he rose up three Times, the Men in the
Boat did not save him.

Yesterday arrived in *Patuxent* Capt. *Judson Coolidge*,
from London. He left the *Land's End* the
first of February.

Capt. *Coolidge* brings Advice, that Capt. *Creagh*,
in the *Charming Molly*, on his Passage home, was
cast away on the Coast of *Ireland*; but the Cargo
was saved without being much damaged: And that
all the other Ships from this Province were arriv'd,
except *Lawrence* and *Thompson*.

Capt. *Chew*, for *Patuxent*, and Capt. *Dulany*,
for *Severn*, failed before *Coolidge*, and are expected
every Hour.

Some Reasons rendered by the Author of the NEW
THEODOLITE (advertised in the Penn-
sylvania Gazette, October 3, 1751), why the
same was invented, and for what the same was
intended, &c.

IT is very well known to all Practitioners in Sur-
veying, that the Variation (in Time) of the
Magnetical Needle makes the Direction very un-
certain to depend upon, in ascertaining the Bound-
aries of Plantations between Neighbours, by reason
that in about 20 Years it differs near one whole
Degree; and likewise is so affected by Iron Mines,
or Load-stones, that it becomes impracticable to
ascertain any Boundaries where any such Ore lie;
and furthermore makes a very different Meridian,
by a Magnetical Operation, to the true Meridian
by the Sun at Noon; and has different Positions in
different Parts of the World, as it is agreed by all
Navigators; which makes it uncertain to depend
on at Sea: So, in the whole, I think it impossible
thereby, with all the Care as may be, to ascertain
Boundaries by any certain Course mentioned, to
stand the Test for any long Series of Years (which
is necessary in such Cases), by reason of it's being
affected by Iron Ore, as well as it's Variation in
Time. Nay, as to it's being affected by Iron Ore,
if it were immediately examined, it would be a
great Chance if you find the same Lines again; for
I have known a Needle vary four Degrees, by mov-
ing my Position about four Perches: So that the
chief Motive which has induced the Subscriber to
the aforesaid Theodolite, were the Reasons above
mentioned, and, if possible, to contrive an Instru-
ment which should stand the Test, if examined, as
long as the Sun and Moon endure; to be done by
the Sun only, without the Help of the Magnetical
Needle; and has fully compleated the same, so as
to answer his Purpose as was intended; viz. if it
may be encouraged, and be thought a proper In-
strument in settling the Boundaries between the
Provinces of *Pennsylvania* and *Maryland*. It has
had some Trial in running Lines, and was approv-
ed by some Artists, as by the said Gazette ap-
pears; and is sufficient to manage several other
Branches, as in Navigation, Astronomy, &c. will
appear, when the full Practice of the Instrument is
shewn by the Author; and is grounded on exact
Theory, as will appear by Practice, without Par-
tiality.
