MR. Nicholas Ruxton Gay in-
trodutory to his Deposition, published in
the Gazette, No. 355, having related, that "At
an Election of Delegates, held some Years ago
in Baltimore County, whereat Mr. Roger Mat-
thews, and Mr. Charles Ridgely, with other
Gentlemen, stood Candidates, Mr. Ridgely had
ten or twelve Votes more than Mr. Matthews;
but that Mr. John Paca, (who was concerned
in taking or adding up the Polls), in Co-samina-
tion with some others, by misplacing or miscast-
ing up the Votes (or perhaps by not rightly
understanding the Rule of Addition), so ordered
it, that Mr. Matthews was declared duly elected;
and that it was communicated to him (Mr. Gay)
by a Gentleman, who was very lately first nam-
ed in the Commission of the Peace for that
County:

I AM, therefore, under a Necessity of appearing
in Print, to justify my Character, so fairly and
ungenteely attack'd: I am not actuated by Malice,
Revenge, or the Spirit of Faction; I shall not re-
turn railing with railing, nor animadvert on that
Gentleman's Deposition, nor on the ill natured Use
that has been made of some Expressions in the Pe-
tition, published in the same Gazette: Neither do I
apprehend, that it is incumbent on me, to justify
that Application to the Honourable the Lower
House of Assembly, the Determination of that
Honourable House, making it wholly unnecessary.
Wherefore, I shall only trouble the Public with the
Deposition of Mr. Parker Hall (who was very
lately first named in the Commission of the Peace,
for Baltimore County; and is the Gentleman who,
as Mr. Gay hath lately acknowledged, did commu-
nicate the Relation to him), declaring in the most
solemn Manner, that I was not concerned in taking
or adding up the Polls, at the Election mentioned
by Mr. Gay, nor at any other Election. I had
not delayed this Publication so long, but from an
Expectation, that Mr. Gay would have prevented
me the Trouble, by clearing up my Character in
