Letters, it seems, have been sent from Rome to Paris, which intimate, that the Pope highly disapproves of the Conduct of the Arch bithop of that Metropolis, and of all those of his Party who refuse the Sacraments to them that have rot submitted to the Constitution Unigenitus, his Holiness judging, that this Buli was publish'd by Pope Clement with no other View than to raise up a Schism in the Church, where nothing but Charity towards one's Neighbour ought to inspire.
