

They, and levying a Tribute on his Subjects. However, these Deys are frequently deposed and put to Death by them, and seldom reign long: Want of Success, or a supposed Mismanagement in the Administration, is looked upon as a sufficient Reason to remove them. Thus the Dey of Tunis is but very lately deposed by his Son, and at Algiers they have murdered four of their Deys and deposed two within the Space of 25 Years. There can never want Traitors among that abandoned Race of Men, composed of Robbers and the Refuse of Turkey, to conspire the Destruction of the reigning Prince and usurp his Throne; for the Soldiers who are vested with this Power of Election, are either Criminals who have been obliged to fly from Turkey, R-negadoes, or Pyrates, who resort thither in hopes of Spoil, and who, notwithstanding their base Original, look upon themselves as Noblemen, using the Moors and other Inhabitants of Africa little better than Slaves. They live chiefly by the Plunder of Merchants that navigate the neighbouring Seas; tho' the Produce of their Country would furnish them abundantly with Materias to traffic with, if they applied themselves to Husbandry and Manufactures.

In a few Days three or four Men of War, design'd for the West Indies, will be put into Commission.

Some considerable additional Buildings are making at Tilbury Fort, and that Fortrefs is ordered to have a general Repair, this and the succeeding Summers.

The Somerset Man of War, at Chatham, has received Orders to be ready for sailing, to be stationed in the Mediterranean.

The Vigilante Man of War is repairing at Chatham, she being soon to sail for the West Indies.

A five 90 Gun Ship, and another of 70 Guns, are building at Chatham, and are ordered to be finished with all possible Expedition.

July 4. Some private Advices from Frankfort intimate, that the Imperialists and Prussians are un-fully earnest in recruiting; that the King of Prussia's Declaration at Vienna, in reference to the Measures he intends to pursue as to East Friesland, makes a great Noise; and that there is a Rumour as if the Austrian Forces would be very speedily sent into Swabia.

July 9. The last Letters from Brest bring a Confirmation, that the Pomona Frigate had taken two English Interlopers that were trading with the French Colonies, valued at 25,000 Livres; and that the Leopard Frigate took another English Ship, detected in a contraband Trade, whose Cargo they reckon to be worth about 40,000 Livres.

On Wednesday Morning one of the Transports in the River fell down to Woolwich, in order to take on board her Stores, which are said to be going for Georgia.

July 17. In the Sermon which the Bishop of Amiens lately preached in his Cathedral, and which has fallen under the Censure of the Parliament of Paris, whose Arret on that Occasion has been sent down to be read and published throughout all the Bailiwicks of the Diocese of Amiens, that zealous Advocate for the Constitution Unigenitus, after a tedious and sophistical Discussion of worthy and unworthy Communions, concludes his Discourse with the following Charge to his Clergy.

Take heed therefore that you be not seduced nor intimidated by those who resist the Pope and Bishops; be not afraid of temporal Judges, who are unqualified to take Cognizance of the Matters: No Dread of Men should hinder you from acting according to the Light of your Conscience. I can do nothing better than address you in the Words of St. John Chrysostom to his Clergy: "Let no human Considerations ever prevail on you to give the Sacraments to unworthy Persons; and if you don't feel yourselves strong enough to withstand them, refer them to me; they shall find me firm and unshakable as a Wall of Brass, &c."

The said Bishop, in the sixth Article of the Brevisary of Amiens, reserv'd to himself alone the Right of absolving all Persons in his Diocese that keep by them the Works of Father Quesnel, or write any thing against the Bull Unigenitus: Which Article the Parliament of Paris has likewise censur'd.

August 1. Since the Robbish has been list'd in Lincoln's Inn, we here that some of the Gentlemen who were Sufferers by the Fire, have had the chief Part of their Properties in Plate and Cash restor'd to them, and Mr. Pickering (Clerk to Mr. Wilbraham), who had Bank Notes in his Desk to the amount of eleven hundred Pounds, the Numbers of which were likewise burnt, has been so successful as to re-establish almost all of them.

August 6. We hear that Sir PETER WARREN died of an inflammatory Fever, on the

26th of July. It is said that his Death was occasioned by his having heated himself in his Return from Fishing, and putting on a damp Shirt, which struck to his Heart, and laid the Foundation for the sudden Disorder that carried him off. He has left behind him a Lady and four Daughters, of whom the eldest is fourteen Years of Age, the second six, the third three, and the fourth three Months old. Capt. Johnson, who brought the Account of his Death, set out again for Ireland, in order to regulate the Admiral's Funeral, as he is to be inter'd in that Country.

NEW BERN, in North Carolina, August 28.

About a Fortnight ago, was committed to Goal in this Town, Four Men; viz. Patrick Moore, a Taylor by Trade, Daniel Johnson, alias Dixon, a Chymist, or Doctor, William Jillett, a Blacksmith, and Peter Matthews, for making bad Money: They were taken by the Sheriff of this County, at Peter Matthews's Houfe, about 30 Miles from this Town, near to which, in a great Swamp, they had erected a Forge, and prepared Moulds and other Materials for making Doubloons, Pistoles, Pieces of Eight, and half Pistereers: There were some of the Doubloons, a Pistole, Pieces of Eight, and half Pistereers found upon them, but so badly done as not to be easily imposed upon any Body; which may be owing to the timely Discovery of the Plot, which prevented their finishing them in the Manner they intended; for the Similitude as to Size, is very exact, only they are much wanting in Colour, which perhaps was to have been the finishing Stroke. Patrick Moore, who upon his Examination, seems to give the clearest Evidence, says, That he liv'd in Virginia, and work'd at his Trade, at the Houfe of one Richard Brooker, in Gloucester County, where the said Daniel Johnson, alias Dixon, and William Jillett, resorted; that the said Boeker gave him the said Moore a small Boat, with Provisions sufficient, to bring the said Johnson, alias Dixon, and William Jillett, with their Bellows, Hammers, Moulds, and other Materials for making Money, into this Province; which he accordingly did about two Months since, and lanced them up Neu's River, from whence they travelled to the Houfe of the said Peter Matthews, as above, set up their Forge, and were proceeding to the good Work; and would, in all Probability, have plyed us plentifully with Doubloons, Pistoles, and Pieces of Eight, had not the Plot been timely discovered.

BOSTON, October 2.

At the Court of Assize, &c. at Worcester, the 21 Tuesday of September last, one Jonathan Fairbanks, of Douglas, was convicted of the Crime of Incest, and adjudged to suffer the Penalty of the Law therefor; viz. to sit upon the Gallows with a Rope about his Neck for the Space of an Hour; and in the way from thence to the Goal to be whipt twenty Stripes, and for ever after to wear a Capital I, of two Inches long, and proportionable in Bigness, cut out in Cloth of a contrary Colour to his Cloaths, and sewed upon his upper Garment either on the Outside of his Arm, or on his Back. And the Week following at the Court of Assize, &c. at Springfield, Daniel Bailey and Mary Raicer of a Place adjoining to Sheffield in that County, were convicted of Adultery, and were sentenced to suffer the Penalty of the Law therefor; viz. to sit on the Gallows with a Rope about their Necks, for the Space of an Hour; to be whipt 40 Stripes each, and to wear a Capital A, two Inches long, on their upper Garments, as above. One Ezekiel Wells was convicted of uttering Counterfeit Dollars, and sentenced to stand in the Pillory an Hour, and suffer three Months Imprisonment.

Last Saturday was sev'night died at Newton, Mrs. Mary Davis, in the 115th or 116th Year of her Age: She retain'd her Memory and Reason to the last.

Friday last Capt. Nicholls arrived here from Halifax, and brought with him 45 French Soldiers, who had deserted from their Camp near Chignecto; and we hear that there is a Disposition in great Numbers of others to desert, as they can find Opportunity. Those come to Town, are young healthy Fellows, and well clothed, and purpose to work with such Persons in Town or Country as incline to employ them. Several of 'em are already engaged, and gone into the Country.

By Letters from Halifax, we have Advice, that one of the Fishing Schooners taken by the Indians at Canfo, some Time since, which belonged to Halifax, was arrived there from St. Peter's, on Cape Breton, the Owner having first paid 2700 Livres to a French Priest, for her Ransom, after she had been plundered of all her fishing Gear and Stores, and a large Quantity of Fish.

A few Days ago, Capt. Elisha Doane, who with others, was taken by the Indians at Canfo, on the 4th of August last (as has been mentioned in this Paper) came to Town, and informs, that upon their Arrival at St. Peter's, all the People were sent to Lousburg, from whence they got Passages to their respective Places of Abode,

WILLIAMSBURG, October 19.

Extra of a Letter from a Gentleman in the back Part of the Country.

"Several of the Indian Traders are come in, who confirm the Account we had of the Indian War, with some additional Circumstances of Horror.

"A Party of French Indians, called Tawaw, assisted by some French, laid Siege to the Twightwee Town, when most of the fighting Men were out a hunting, and scarce any Body left but the Women, old Men, and a few Traders; notwithstanding which the Town made a brave Resistance, and killed 36 of the French and Tawaws, but were at last overpower'd by Numbers, and all who were so unfortunate as to fall into the Enemies Hands, put to Death in a most cruel Manner. Among the rest of the Prisoners there was an old Chief of the Twightwees, who, from his great Friendship to the English, was usually called the Old Briton; him and one of the Shanoak Kings they eat. They ripp'd up several of the white Mens Bellies, and eat their Hearts and Livers; with many other shocking Acts of Barbarity. The Six Nations are so exasperated with this inhuman Treatment of their Allies, that they and all the Ohio Indians have declared War against the French, and laid themselves under a solemn Oath to eat every Frenchman they can lay their Hands on; and not to leave a Man, Woman, or Child of the Tawaw Nation alive. The Twightwees have sent to the Westward, to assemble their numerous Tribes. Tomahawks and black Wampum are continually passing from one Town to another, and nothing but Revenge and Blood is to be heard of among the Indians."

October 12. We hear from the upper Parts of the Country, that the heavy Rains which fell there about a Fortnight ago, have occasioned the greatest Freshes known for many Years, by which very considerable Damage has been done to the Land contiguous to the Rivers. The Water rose in many Places, near Thirty Feet perpendicular, carrying away all the Bridges, and many Houses. Several Gentlemen have suffer'd very considerably by the Loss of their Tobacco Houses, and other Damage to their Plantations.

NEW YORK, October 9.

Extra of a Letter from Caracas, dated September 9, 1752.

"This Island is so infested with Privateers, that there is scarce any Openings for Commerce. You will, no doubt, have heard of a Spanish Privateer's taking a Sloop as she lay at Anchor at Boneira, a few Weeks ago: I can also acquaint you, that three Days ago another Privateer appeared there, and took a Schooner belonging to this Place, and another Vessel: The Schooner was bound for the Margaretas, with a Cargo of the Value of 13,000 Pieces of Eight on board; she mounted 8 Carriage Guns, besides Swivels, and 45 Men; and yet never fired a Gun. By this we seem to be much degenerated from our former Glory, in which we always esteem'd ourselves not to be equalled."

Capt. Bennett, who arrived here on Saturday Evening, in 20 Days from Jamaica, informs us, that on Sunday the first Instant, in Lat. 36, his Vessel broach'd to, in a very hard Gale at N. W. and by her Ballast shifting she immediately over-set; but on their cutting away the main Shrouds, their Mast went overboard, and she righted a little; but 'twas near 48 Hours before they could get her upright. He lost his Forefall, Main-topfall, Tray-fail, and Sheet Anchor, but by good Providence none of his People received any Hurt. Capt. Bennett further informs us, that Commodore Coates is using all the Means in his Power, to protect the Trade of that Island; and that two Brigs, with his Assistance, were well fitted and mann'd, with a Design to trade upon the Spanish Main.

October 2. By Capt. Emott, arrived last Week at Elizabeth-Town, in 14 Days from Barbadoes, we hear that Admiral Knowles, in the Wager Man of War, from England, in Company with another Man of War station'd at Barbadoes, arriv'd at that Island the 27th of August; and was to sail again in two or three Days, for his Government of Jamaica.

On Thursday last a New Jersey Man, tall and pock-fretten, paid ten Pieces of Eight in a Shop in this City; and on Friday, it was discovered that three of them were counterfeit'd: The Bulk, Im-
