We are informed by Letters from Bassi, that the French Squadron which was sent to I'm poli, has since put into the Port of Ajiccio, where it actually lies, and does not feem to be in haite to return to Toulon.

Modena, August 14. The Duke, our Sovereign, being informed of the Accession of the Kings of Sar dinia and the two Sicilies to the Treaty of Madrid. has refolved to accede to it likewife, on Cond tion that his Dominions be guarantied in the fame man ner as is stipulated for the Territories of these two Princes, and the States of the Infant Duke of Parma.

Vienna, August 16. The Empress Queen has confented that the Protestants of the Upper Austria may remove out of that Province, purluant to their Request, but upon Condition that they go and set-tle in Hungary; which Condition a great Number of them have accepted.

Paris, August 21. It is worthy to be noted, as an Example of conjugal Tenderness to Persons of all Racks, that the Dauphiness, during the Illness of her august Confort, said aside all Ceremonies, and, regardless of her Dignity, performed the same Functions as the Nurses, wearing like them a Lin-nen Apron: And when the Distemper was at the most dangerous Crisis, being warned of the Risque the run by her Attendance, the heroically answer'd,
It is not about me that you ought to be uneasy;
a Wife for a Dauphin may be had at any Time, but another Dauphin is not so easy to be found."

Dublin, August 4. On Saturday last the Corpse of Sir PETER WARREN, which had been before embalme, and laid in a Lead Cossin, was put into another covered with black Velvet, finely adorned with Silver glt Plates; his Arms, Sup-porters and Creft, and the following Inscription; Sir PETER WARREN, Knight of the Bath, and Rear Admiral of the Red, died the 29th of Ju-19, 1752, aged 48, and afterwards deposited in a Vault under St. Mary's Church, till such Time as an Order for the Funeral shall come from London, whither his Nephew, Capt.
