B O S T O N .

October 30. Monday last two Men (Brothers) named John and Jonathan Webber, were convicted of uttering counterfeit Dollars, several of which were found upon them, and a Cake or Lump of the Metal of which they are supposed to be made, was found on board a Sloop to which they belonged. The Metal they are made of, is like hard Pewter, or Block Tin, and, with some Strain, will bend. They are but clumsily done, the Stamp being thick and obscure, the Decoration round the Edge very uneven and irregular, and are less in Weight than the true Dollars. These Brethren in Irregularity (tis said) belong to Wells in the County of York; and had been here but a few Days before they were detected. They are now confined in the Prison in this Town.

The same Day a young Man at the North End of this Town, rose as well as usual, but was soon after suddenly seized, and died presently: His tender Mother, seeing her Son's Distress and Danger, fell into Fits, and died an Hour or two after.

Thursday last, the Gentlemen commissioned by his Honour the Lieutenant Governor, to treat with the Eastern Indians at St. George's Fort, returned hither in the Country Sloop; and we hear, that after a free and open Conference of three Days, the Ratification of the former Treaties of Peace and Friendship was finished and signed by both Parties. There were present about 130 Indians, Men, Women and Children, who all behaved in a very peaceable and friendly Manner, and about 30 of their head Men signed the Treaty.

Extract of a Letter from London, dated August 1. "The Harvest all over Europe is so great, that there is like to be little or no Export of Corn this Year; and of Course no Freights stirring for Lisbon, or indeed any where else."

N E W - Y O R K .

November 6. By Capt. Coon in 7 Weeks from Lisbon, we have Advice, that a few Days before he sailed, a Vessel arrived there from the Streights, the Master of which informed him, That on the 7th of July last, two Barbary Corsairs of 40 Guns each, were brought into the Island of Malta, by the Maltese Fleet; and that they had, after an Engagement of three Days, burnt and sunk four others of inferior Force: That they had certain Account at Lisbon, that the French had actually declared War against the Algerines; that upwards of 30 Sail of Vessels were arrived there from the Streights, with Corn; that a fine new 50 Gun Ship, built after the English Model, was launched during his Stay there, and that two others of the same Force, were then on the Stocks, and for warding with all possible Expedition.

November 13. Capt. Herring from Providence in 21 Days, informs us, That on the 23d of September last, they had a violent Gale of Wind at Crooked Island, which obliged all the Providence Wood Cutters then there, either to run ashore or cut away their Masts; that Geese, Ducks, Turkeys, Hogs, Sheep, Swines, and the Pump of a Vessel of 9 Feet Hold, with the Main Mast of a Schooner, were found upon that Island, but no Vessel nor People to be seen: That two Ships were cast upon the Hogsties; at which Place, a Sloop belonging to Capt. Adams, of Bermuda, was, with her Cargo and two Men lost; the Captain and the rest of the Crew arrived at Providence the 6th ult.

December 4. By a Letter from Bermuda, we learn, that four Negroes and a White Man, are committed to Goal there, on Suspicion of their carrying on a Plot to destroy all the Whites on that Island.

We are credibly informed, that a Spanish Gal- leon, with several Chests of Money on board, is put into New London, in Distress.

P H I L A D E L P H I A .

November 16. A Letter from Charles Town, in South Carolina, since the Hurricane, advises, that the Crops have suffer'd so much, that it is thought there will not be Rice enough to serve the Inhabitants; and that a Supply of Indian Corn will be wanted from the other Colonies.

Monday last a Court of Oyer and Terminet was held here, when Daniel Hurley was indicted for the Murder of James Clarke; to which Indictment he pleaded Guilty, and received Sentence of Death.

November 23. From St. Eastia there is Advice, that Capt. Stevens in his Passage thither from this Place, met with a violent Gale of Wind, in

which he lost a Parcel of valuable Horses he was carrying there.

Tuesday Night last a Fire happen'd at the Seat of Joseph Turner, Esq; at Mount Pleasant, which destroy'd the Kitchen, Wash House, and Dairy House; but by pulling down a Piazza, that join'd them to the Great House, it was happily saved.
