BOSTON.

He seemed to be in great Pain, foam'd at the Mouth, and endeavoured to speak, but in vain, and died in a short Time. The next Day his Head was opened by a skilful Surgeon, who found his Skull fractured, and a large Quantity of coagulated and extravasated Blood between the Bone and the Skin, occasioned by some violent Blows, which was judged to be the Cause of his Death; and it appearing to the Jury of Inquest, that the Deceased had received some Blows with a Club from one Chubb, a sturdy white Boy, and a Negro Fellow of the Gang, they were both committed to Goal.
