Last Monday Morning, died, at his Plantation  
about 5 Miles from Town, in the Sixty third, or  
grand climacterical Year of his Age, Mr. THOMAS  
WORTHINGTON, who, for many Years past, and  
to the Time of his Death, was one of the Represent-  
atives for this County, in the Lower House of As-  
sembly: He served his Country with a steady and  
uninterested Fidelity, was strictly honest in Princi-  
ple and Practice, and therefore had the Esteem of  
all that knew him; he was a good Father and a  
sincere Friend, was frugal and industrious, and was  
possid of many other good Qualities, which consti-  
tute the Character of a good and sincere Christian.

On Saturday last, died, at his Plantation, on the  
North Side of Severn, Capt. PHILIP JONES, in  
the Eight Year of his Age: He was for many Years  
in the Commission of the Peace: From the natural  
Mildness of his Temper, he made a good Master to  
those under him, and was so strict a Predefinarian,  
that when any Sickness affected himself, or Family,  
he had no Confidence in human Aid, asserting, that  
every Man was destin'd at a certain Time to die,  
of Consequence never would apply to a Physician.
