PARIS, April 13.

LETTERS from Rochelle advise, that
in the Night, between the 4th and 5th,
happened, on that Coast, one of the
most violent Tempests ever remembered,
which did considerable Damage. An
outward bound East India man, and a Lubecker,
were lost in the River of Bourdeaux, with all the
Crew: All the Vessels in the Road of Rochelle,
except one, were drove ashore; and three, bound
to St. Domingo, entirely beat to Pieces: And two
Vessels, bound to America, and four small Vessels,
were lost in the River Nantz.

Venice, April 11, Private Letters from Con-
stantinople, bring Advice of the Departure of se-
veral Pachas, in order to assemble the different
Bodies of Troops which are to compose the Grand
Signior's Army, which, it is said, will consist of
above 80000 Men. It is also said, that independ-
ent of this Army, there will be one composed of
the Troops which are in the Provinces of Asia.
We are very impatient to know the Motive of
these Motions, or whether they are only to be
looked upon as necessary to keep the turbulent
Disposition of the Janizaries within proper Bounds.

Genoa, April 7. The Marquis de Grimaldi,
Commissary of the Republic in the Island of Cor-
fica, having acquainted the Senate, that several
Pieces of that Island had sent Deputies to him, to
treat about an Accommodation, the lesser Council
assembled a few Days ago, and when they broke
up a Felucca was dispatch'd to Bastia, with fresh
Instructions for that Commissary, and enjoining
him to take all Opportunities to inform the Cor-
sicans that the Republic is quite dispos'd to forget
all that has pass'd upon Condition that they will
return to their lawful Obedience, and acknowlege,
that they ought to have Recourse only to that Pow-
er which it has pleas'd God to put them under,
to deliver them from the Distress which they have
so long been in. These Instructions are a Proof
that the Republic is not yet determin'd to dispos-
itself of that Island, and that if any Overtures
have been made for this Purpose, some political Con-
siderations have prevented their being embraced.

Madrid, April 13. Baron Wassenauer, Ambassa-
dor from the States General, has deliver'd a Mem-
orial to the Council appointed for the Manage-
ment of the Affairs of the Indies, in order to ob-
tain Satisfaction for the unlawful Proceedings of
the Spanish Privateers, with regard to the Dutch
Ships that trade to the West Indies.

Hague, April 22. We hear that the Town of
Tangier has acceded to the late Treaty of Peace
concluded between the States General and the Em-
peror of Morocco.

Lisbon, April 3. By the last Letters from Rio
de Janeiro we have Advice, that the Inhabitants
of the Colony of St. Sacramento shew great Reluc-
tance to live under the Spanish Government, which
they are oblig'd to by the late Treaty of Exchange
between the two Crowns; that they have commit-
ted great Outrages on the Occasion, and have even
a second Time destroyed the Land Marks that
were set up by Order of the Spanish Governor.
When these Letters came away no violent Methods
had been taken, but 'twas thought nothing but
Force of Arms would oblige them to submit.

Ratisbon, April 19. As his Prussian Majesty de-
clared above two Years ago, and again last Year,
that he would not have his Title to East Frizeland
canvass'd by the Aulic Council, nor would ever re-
gard any Sentence of that Tribunal in this Affair:
And as several considerable Members of the Dyet
have already protested against the Assembly's Reso-
lution to refer this Matter to the Decision of that
Tribunal, it is apprehended that the pushing of it
vigorously may be productive of some Disturbances in
Germany.

Dublin, April 20, Yesterday the following Let-
ter, inclosing 90 l. in Bank Notes, was left on a

Table in the Dublin Coffee House, directed to Mr.
Charles O'Hara.

"Sir, — The inward Meltings of Compassion for
suffering Innocence, and that bitter Remorse ever
inseparable from Guilt, which it is impossible to stife,
are the Motives of restoring you 90 l. in four Bank
Notes inclosed. The Manner of your being wronged
is so surprizing, and so mysterious, that you may
cease further Enquiry, for it is impossible for you to
find it out: It is, and will be, an impenetrable Sec-
ret on this Side the Grave. Those you suspect are
wholly innocent, those you accuse are greatly injur'd;
but now I hope they will be relieved, and the in-
tolerable Stings of a guilty Conscience removed. —
Farewell. B. C."

LONDON.

April 17. Yesterday Dr. Cameron of Lochiel,
was brought to Town under a strong Guard of
Dragoons, and secured in the Tower.

By a Letter from Florence we hear, that Capt.
V —, the Son of a brave English Officer, being
put under an Arrest, on Account of a Challenge
given, rather than comply with the Offer made of
asking Pardon, stabbed himself in his Apartment,
and died instantly.

They write from Aberdeen, that last Week a
mad Dog bit eight black Cattle, belonging to a
Farmer in Rutaven near Huntley, several of which
went mad immediately. In order to prevent the
bad Consequences, the Proprietor caused the Whole
of them to be shot.

April 19. We hear that Orders have been sent
to Scotland, to keep a sharp Look-out at the se-
veral Sea Ports there, to know what Persons ar-
rive from foreign Parts.

Yesterday was held a Board of Admiralty, when a
20 Gun Ship, and three Sloops of War, were or-
dered to be fitted out, to cruise off the Coast of
Scotland.

May 1. On Tuesday Evening Dr. Cameron
was brought from the Tower to the Cockpit,
Whitehall, where he underwent a long Examinati-
on before the Council; after which he was sent
back to the Tower. We hear he denies being
the Person he was taken for.

Letters from Rochfort, of the 7th Instant, ad-
vise, that the two Men of War, ordered to be fit-
ted out there, will speedily put to Sea, and join
the Tyger, the Leopard, and the Thetis, which
they are equipping at Brest; and that some Land
Forces are to be put on board of this Squadron,
to reinforce the Garrison of Pondicherry, though some
say that the Destination of the Squadron is not
known.

Gloucester, April 14. Yesterday were executed
here, pursuant to their Sentence, at our late Assi-
zes, Anne Williams for poisoning her Husband;
Walter Crabb, for stealing upwards of 40 l. and
William Weobly for sheep stealing. The two
latter behaved with the greatest Composure both
after Sentence and at the Place of Execution, where
they acknowledged the Justness of their Condemna-
tion, and freely forgave every Body, as they hoped
Forgiveness at God's Hands: But Anne Williams,
who was burnt at the Stake, protested her Inno-
cence of the Fact for which she suffered with a Be-
haviour quite unbecoming.

SIR,

If the Oddity of the following Story will recommend
it to your Notice, it is at your Service. I lately
discovered it among other Papers, which may
have many Years been thrown aside,

I am your constant Reader, &c.

IN Domfront, in Normandy, the Curate, in
Virtue of a very old Custom, obliges the Peo-
ple to pay their Christening and Burial Expences
both together. The People have indeed frequent-
ly complain'd, but always received for Answer,

That what Persons of his Cloth did, was not for
the Laity to find fault with; they therefore thought
proper to complain to the Archbishop of Rouen;
and the Curate appeared, he owned the Facts to
save the Time of examining Witnesses, but desired
his Grace to hear his Reasons. He had been Cu-
rate of that Parish, he said, seven Years; had christ-
ened one Year with another 100 Children, and
strange! not buried one. At first he had rejoiced
at his good Fortune, to be placed in an Air so
healthy; but one Day locking into the Register
Book had found, that for 100 Years back near
the said Number had been yearly baptized, and
not one above five Years o'd buried, and still the
Number of Communicants as few now as they were
then. This, tho' seemingly a Mystery, upon En-
quiry he found the true Cause of; for all that are
born at Domfront, said he, are hanged at Rouen,
and I therefore was necessitated to do this, to keep
my Parishioners from hanging; encouraging them
to die at home, from the Consideration of the bu-
rial Duties being previously defrayed. The Bishop
demanded to know the Truth of this; and upon
being answered, too many of them, it must be con-
fessed, came to their untimely End at Rouen, ap-
proved of what the Curate had done, and caused
his Secretary, in *perpetuam rei memoriam*, to make
an Act of it, which the Curate carried home, and
the Parish submitted, and have found much Benefit,
the Number of natural Deaths there increasing
yearly.

St. JOHN'S, (in Antigua) June 1.

A Description of the *Ship Nancy*. William Shearer
Master, seized by the Crew in the River Gambis,
on a pyratyical Design, the first Day of April, 1753.

BUILT in the Colony of Connecticut, Bur-
then 70 Tons, nine Months o'd, deep waisted,
six Ports of a Side, five of which are open, and
painted with Vermillion, mounted with four Guns,
1 Pounders, two Quarter Scuttles Vermillion paint-
ed from the upper Part of the Ports to the lower
Part; the Outside is painted black, and freez'd with
Pearl Colour, very large Freeze; the upper Streak
on the Roundhouse plain Vermillion; the Streak
below that, green, with a small yellow Freeze;
Square Stern painted the same; under her Counter
blue, with yellow Curtains; and steers with a
Wheel; has no Register or Custom House Papers,
or any other Papers relating to the Cargo.

A Description of the Men on board.

William Read, Mate, born in Pasley, near
Glasgow, aged about 24 Years, about five Feet
seven Inches high, a fair Complexion, reddish
Hair and Eye-brows, and when he speaks fast
stammers a little in his Speech: He informed the
Master that he serv'd his Time to Capt. Collin
Dunlop, in Greenock.

Robert Douglass, Boatswain, born in Yorkshire,
about 40 Years of Age, five Feet eleven Inches
high, very red Hair, and his Face very much freck-
led; he sailed long in Privateers from Rhode Island,
in the late War.

Robert Turner, born in Aberdeenshire, aged a-
bout 24 Years, five Feet nine Inches high, of a
black Complexion, very much Pock mark'd.

Cuthbert Chicken, born in Newcastle on Tyne,
aged about 22 Years, five Feet eight Inches high,
speaks broad North Country, and served his Time
in the Coal Trade.

John Ellis, from about East Smithfield, London,
aged about 22 Years, of a black Complexion, a-
bout five Feet two Inches.

James Pheasant, from about Fleet Bridge, Lon-
don, aged about 24 Years, five Feet ten Inches,
of a black Complexion, thin, spare, and quite il-
literate: He sailed from New York for some
Years.

Thomas M'Muchan, aged about 18 Years, five
Feet high, born in Ireland, smooth Face, and has
the Irish Pronunciation broad. The Master says
that he believes that M'Muchan was quite igno-
rant
