At this Instant a fishing Schooner was coming through the Gut, and the People seeing the two Women in Distress, immediately threw out their Boat and took them up, as they afterwards did the Man. The Women were so far gone that they had no Sense or Motion, but are now in a fair Way of Recovery. It is greatly to be wished, that People upon a Frolick, especially on the Water, would be careful and wise, as well as merry.

NEW-YORK, July 2.

By Cap. Seymour, from South Carolina, we have a Letter advising, that about the Beginning of June, one of the Kings of the Creek Indians, with a Number of Attendants, arrived at Charles-Town, in order to renew their Friendship with the English; that after having been suitably entertained, and received Presents, they set out to return; but on the first Night after, a young Fellow, Son to the King, was shot, near Dorchester, and his Scalp with Part of his Skull, carried away. An Express was thereupon sent back to the Governor, who instantly set out with the Town Troop of Horse and a Detachment from the Independent Companies, for Dorchester: But that notwithstanding the most diligent Enquiry, nothing more could be discovered, than that the young Creek must have been killed by an Indian, an Eagle's Feather, and some Beads being left near the Body. His said, the Creek Indians were much pleased with his Excellency's Appearance, and afterwards proceeded on their Journey much satisfied. We hear further, that just before Capt. Seymour sailed, six Cherokee Indians were brought into Charles Town, who were there supposed to be the Author of the young Creek's Death.

At Norwalk, in Connecticut, about ten Days ago, two Lads of that Place went into the Water to wash, when one of them not knowing how to swim, got out of his Depth, and the other going to his Assistance they were both drowned, in the Sight of several Spectators, who were not able to help them.

July 16. We have Letters receiv'd in Town on Saturday Night last, from England, dated the 30th of April, and from undoubted Authority, which mentions particularly the Appointment of Sir D'Anvers Osborne, Kt. to the Government of the two Provinces of New-York and New Jersey.

PHILADELPHIA.

July, 19. Last Week a Brewer's Servant of this City fell into a boiling Copper, by which he was so scalded, that he died soon after.

On Tuesday Night a House in Chestnut-street was broke open, and a Silver Watch, &c. carried off.

Yesterday, in the Morning, a Girl was attack'd by Christopher Martin, and Patrick Ryan, on the Highway, betwixt this Town and Kensington, and robb'd of Six Shillings and Eight-pence; but being seen by some People, were immediately taken up, carried before a Magistrate, and sent to Prison. In the Afternoon a Negro Boy was detected picking a Man's Pocket at the Vendue, under the Court house: And several People, of both Sexes, who could give no good Account of themselves, being found in a disorderly House on Society-Hill, were ordered to the Workhouse.

The same Day a Fire broke out in a Baker's House in Front-street, but was soon extinguished, without doing much Damage.

The Captain of a Vessel from North-Carolina informs, that on his Passage he saw a Sloop ashore high and dry on Cape Hatteras.
