In all trading Countries in the World, the Places or Ports for landing, and ſhipping Goods, are limited to a very few Number; and this, for the Help of Trade, by collecting it in a compact Body. Pennsylvania flouriſhes from it's Trade, which is great, and which, from it's being united and ſolid, leaves no room for any diſperſed ſtragling Trade of it's Neighbours, to Vie with it: They have but one Port, and that is the great, the only Advantage, they have over Maryland, which, indeed, is very great; but it is what we alſo can have, and hold, together with our many natural Advantages, ſuch as they have not, nor can ſupply by Art.

Suppoſe Maryland had two Ports, one on each Shore, then would Numbers of Merchants, and conſequently all Sorts of People, intantly flock to theſe Ports, and be mutually aſſiſting to one another in their reſpective Occupations. The Farmer and Planter would never miſt of a certain Market, quick Diſpatch, and a higher Price for their Commodities, than they now get, as is plain from Reaſon, and the Inſtances of the Philadelphia, and Norfolk MARKETS:

And then might the Inſpection Law be executed at leſs than one Fifth of the preſent Charge—thus, The Number of Bay Shallops would be conſtantly employed in bringing Tobacco, (Wheat, Corn, &c.) to theſe two Ports, and quickly Diſpatch the Shipping, as they arrive; the Tobacco being firſt lodged and inſpected in a Warehouse, or Houſes, one of which ſhould be at each Port, and coſt (ſuppoſe) each 500l. — — — — — 1000 : 00 : 0

Mr. TIMOTHY,

I HAVE ſeveral Times this Season, when there was an Appearance of a Thunder Storm ſucceeded in making Mr. FRANKLIN's Experiment with a Kite, for drawing the Lightning from Clouds, and laſt Monday I repeated the ſame with remarkable Succeſs, before many Spectators. The Flow of the Electrical Fluid, or of the Matter of Lightning, was ſo rapid and copious down the Line near 700 Feet long, to the Key appended at the lower End of the Line, that from thence I obtain'd Sparks of Lightning as thick and long as the firſt two Joints of a Man's little Finger, and theſe as quick one after another as I could bring the Loop of a Wire, which I uſed for that Purpoſe, within about two Inches of the Key: And the Snappings from the Key were ſo ſmart and loud, that they were heard at the Diſtance of at leaſt 200 Yards. A ten Ounce Phial, coated, was then properly ſuſpended by the Key, that it might be charged, but the Flux of the Electrical Matter down the Line was ſo copious, that the Phial was charged almoſt as ſoon as it was hung to the Key, and the Surcharge continued flying off for a conſiderable Time, from the End of the Phial's Hook, making a very loud hisſing Noiſe. I then endeavoured, without taking the Phial off the Key, to diſcharge it in the uſual Manner, but as ſoon as I brought the Loop of the Wire to the Coating of the Phial, I received ſuch a Shock up to my boulder, that I failed in the Attempt; and before I could be furniſhed with a longer Wire to diſcharge the Phial, without receiving a Shock, all the Electrical Fluid or Lightning in the Cloud was drawn from thence and diſcharged in the Air, with a hisſing Noiſe, from the Extremity of the Phial's Hook. A greater Degree of Serenity ſoon ſucceeded, and no more of the awful Noiſe of Thunder, before expected, was heard. I am, SIR,

CHARLES-TOWN, May 28.

ON Saturday laſt arrived in Town, accom- panied by Mr. and Mrs. Boſomworth, one Mr. Chatie, and ſeveral of our Traders (and escorted by the three Troops of Horſe by his Excellency the Governor's Order) upwards of 100 Indians from the Creek Nation, amongſt which are Malatchi their Emperor, and about 20 of their Chieftains or Warriors, in order to renew and ratify the ſeveral Treaties of Peace and Commerce that have heretofore ſubſiſted betwixt them and this Government, &c. Upon which Occaſions they are to have an Audience of his Excellency and the Council, in a Day or Two.

We hear, that nine Northern Indians were diſcovered laſt Week about Pedee, where 'tis ſaid they have killed ſome of our Settlement Indians; and there being ſome Reaſon to think they have come farther down, the Militia in thoſe Parts have been raiſed and gone in Queſt of them.

June 18. A few Days ago an Expreſs from Virginia, brought Diſpatches to our Governor, from Governor Dinwiddie, giving an Account, that the French had marched a large Body of regular Troops and Indians, from Canada, with a Deſign to diſſodge a Settlement lately made by the Government of Virginia on the Ohio River; and we hear, they give out, that after they have driven off, or deſtroyed the English, they will take Poſſeſſion of that Country themſelves, and build Forts there. Accounts from Governor Hamilton of Pennsylvania, and from Governor Clinton of New-York, confirm what is above, but they widely differ in the Number of which the French Army is ſaid to conſiſt. Some pretend to affirm, that a great Party of them is intended againſt our Friends the Catawba's, a brave little Nation firmly attached to this Government: Should the French ſucceed in ſacrificing them, it might have the Effect to weaken the Friendſhip of the other Indian

Nations in Alliance with us, and render the Peace of this Province much more precarious.

There have been for ſome Days paſt in Town, ſome of the Chiefs of the Cherokees, and ſeveral more of the principal Head Men of that Nation are hourly expected: We learn, that their Buſineſs was, to confirm, in the Governor's Preſence, the Peace lately made betwixt them and the Creeks, by his Excellency's Mediation, but the Creeks having waited ſome Time in Town in Expectation of their Arrival, had return'd to their own Country the Week before: Before their Departure, they gave the ſtrongeſt Aſſurances, that they would obſerve the Peace on their Parts, and deſired, that the Governor would join the Cherokees to do ſo on theirs. Theſe two Nations have been frequently put at Variance by the Artifices of the French, and have been thereby weakened, but they ſtill make up a Number of between 5 and 6000 Gun-men.

This Day ſome Northern Indians, lately taken and brought to Town by Capt. David Godin's Company of Militia, were examined before his Excellency in Council; they call themſelves Savannahs or Schawanoes, and ſay they live on the Ohio River, but being aſk'd ſeparately, what Buſineſs they had in this Country, or what Deſign they came upon, they gave very inconſiſtent and contradictory Answers. Several of them had riſed Guns, and they were all well armed. A Belt of black Wampum, Strings for tying of Slaves, a Cruſt, and ſeveral Bracelets of Silver, were found in the Bundle belonging to the Head man, or Captain of the Gang. Captain Gallin's Behaviour upon this Occaſion has been very much applauded, and it is hoped, that all the Officers of the Militia will exert themſelves in like Manner, which will ſoon clear the Country of theſe French and Northern Indians that have for ſome Years paſt infeſted this Province.

Extrakt of a Letter from a Gentleman at Auguſta, in Georgia, dated the 17th Inſtant.

"This Morning the Creeks [who lately came up from Charles Town] had an Account of 4 Northern Indians being ſeen ſkulking about the Sand-Bar laſt Night; about 11 a Clock, to Day, a Party of them went out ſcouring; and by 3 Malatchi and his People came to our Houſe with the Death Whoop: They brought one Fellow alive, whom they had beaten very much, and the Scalp, with Part of the Scull of one they kill'd [we have been told, that to take Part of the Scull (with the Scalp) is the greateſt Indignity that can be offered to Indians, and that they ſeldom forgive it.] They came up with them near Mr. O.K's, about a Mile from Fort Auguſta. The one they kill'd is judged to be a Nottawega, by his Hair, Hatchet, and two ſmall wooden Images that were tied round his Neck; the other talks Cherokee, is believed to be of that Nation, and was down here about a Month ſince with the Chickaſaw's. From this they carried him to Mr. Rae's, there beat him again, and ſtuck their Knives into his Body, and at laſt with a Hatchet chopt off his Head."

We cannot yet inform our Readers, what is intended to be done with the Schawanoes Indians lately taken.

'Tis ſaid, that eight Guarda de Coſtas, and two Friegates of 30 Guns, from Marinico, are continually cruizing about that Iſland, and take every Veſſel they can come up with.

The Headmen of the Lower Cherokees have been ſome Time in Town, and as that Part of the Nation ſuffered moſt by the War with the Creeks, they have expreſſed the greateſt Deſire for Peace; the other Chiefs are ſince arrived, and all Diſputes between them and the Creeks are likely to be ſoonly ſettled in a few Days.
