HAVE several Times this Season, when there awas an Affearance of a Thunder Storm Succeeded in making Mr. FRANKLIN's Experiment with a Kite, for drawing the Lightning from Clouds, and last Monday I repeated the same with remark able Success, before many Spellators. The Flow of the Electrical Fluid, or of the Mutter of Lightning. the Eleditical Fluid, or of the Matter of Lightning, was so rapid and copious down the Line near 700 Feet long, to the Key appended at the lower End of the Line, that from thence I obtain'd Sparks of Lightning as thick and long as the first two Joints of a Man's little Finger, and these as quick ont as ter another as I could bring the Loop of a Wire, which I used for that Purpose, within about two Inches of the Key: And the Snappings from the Key were so smart and loud, that they were heard at the Distance of at least 200 Yards. A ten Ounce Phial, coated, was then properly suspended by the Key, that it might be charged, but the Flux of the Elestrical Matter down the Line was so cotious, that the Phial was charged almost as soon as it was that the Phial was charged aimost as soon as it was that the Phial was charged almost as soon as it was king to the Key, and the Surcharge continued sping off for a considerable Time, from the End of the Thial's Hook, making a wery loud hissing Noise. I then endeavoured, without taking the Phial off the Key, to discharge it in the usual Manner, but as soon as I brought the Loop of the Wire to the Coating of the Phial, I received such a Shock up to my boulder, that I failed in the Attempt; and before I could be surnished with a longer Wire to discharge the Phial, without receiving a Shock, all the Electrical Fuid or Lightning in the Cloud was drawn from thence and discharge in the Air, with a hisfrom thence and discharged in the Air, with a his-fing Noise, from the Extremity of the Phia's Hook. A greater Degree of Serenity scon succeeded, and no more of the anuful Noise of Thunder, before expected, I am, SIR, was heard.

Charles Town, May 15, 1753.

CHARLES-TOWN, May 28. N Satorday last arrived in Town, accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Bosomworth, one Mr. Chatie, and several of our Traders (and es corted by the three Troops of Horse by his Excel lency the Governor's Orders) upwards of 100 Indians from the Creek Nation, amongst which are Malatchi their Emperor, and about 20 of their Chieftians or Warriors, in order to renew and ratify the several Frenties of Peace and Commerce that have heretofore subfisted betwixt them and this Government, &c. Upon which Occasions they are to have an Audience of his Excellency and the Conneil; in a Day or Two.

We hear, that nine Northern Indians were dif covered last Week about Pedee, where 'tis faid they have killed fome of our Settlement Indians ; and there being same Reason to think they have

come farther down, the Militia in those Parts have been raised and gone in Quest of them.

June 18. A few Days ago an Express from Virginia, brought Dispatches to our Governor, from Governor Dinwiddie, giving an Account, that the French had marched a large Body of regular Troops and Indians, from Canada, with a Defign to ciflodge a Settlement lately made by the Government of Virginia on the Onlo River; and we hear, they give out, that after they have driven off, or definoyed the English, they will take Poffesion of that Country themselves, and build Forts there. Accounts from Governor Hamilton of Pennsylvania, and from Governor Clinton of New-York, confirm what is above, but they widely dif-fer in the Number of which the French Army is faid to confift. Some pretend to affirm, that a great Party of them is intended against our Friends the Catawba's, a brave little Nation firmly attached to this Government: Should the French succeed in facr ficing them, it might have the Effect to weaken the Priendship of the other Indian

Nations in Alliance with us, and ren ler the Peace of this Province much more precarious.

There have been for some Days past in Town, fome of the Chiefs of the Cherokers, and feveral more of the principal Head Men of that Nation are hourly expected: We learn, that their Bufiness was, to confirm, in the Governor's Presence, the Peace lately made betwixt them and the Creeks, by his Excellency's Mediation, but the Creeks having waited fime Time in Town in Expediation of their Arrival, had return'd to their own Country the Week before : Before their Departure, they gave the strongest Assurances, that they would observe the Peace on their Paris, and defired, that the Governor would er join the Cherokees to do it on theirs. These two Nations have been frequently put at Variance by the Artifices of the French, and have been thereby weakened, but they still make up a Number of between 5 and 6000 Gun men.

This Day some Northern Ind ans, lately taken and brought to Town by Capt. David Godin's Company of Militia, were examined before his Excellency in Council; they call themseives Savannahs or Schawanoes, and fay they live on the Ohio River, but being afk'd feparately, what Bu-One River, but being after deparately, what Bu-finess they had in this Country, or what Design they came upon, they gave very inco-sistent and contradictory Answers. Several of them had risted Guiss, and they were all well armed. A' Belt of black Wampum, Strings for tying of Slaves, a Cross, and several Bracelets of Silver, were found in the Bundle belonging to the Head man, or Captain of the Gang. Captain Gastin's Behaviour upon this Occasion has been very much applauded, and it is hoped, that all the Officers of the Militia and it is hoped, that all the Officers of the Militia will exert themselves in like Manner, which will foon clear the Country of these French and Northern Indians that have for some Years past iafetted this Province.

Extract of a Letter from a Gentleman at Augusts, in Georgia, dated the 17th Inflant. " This Morning the Creeks [who lately came

up from Charles Towi ] had an Account of 4 Northern Indians being feen skulking about the Sand-Bar last Night; about 11 a Clock, to Day, a Party of them went out scouling; and by 3 Malatchi and his People came to our House with the Death Whoop: They brought one Fellow alive, whom they had beaten very much, and the Scalp, with Part of the Scall of one they kill'd [we have been told, that to take Part of the Scull (with the Scalp) is the greatest Indignity that can be offered to Indians, and that they feldom forgive it.]
They came up with them near Mr. O.k's, about a Mile from Fort Augusta. The one they kill'd is judged to be a Nottawega, by his Hair, Hatchet, and two small wooden Images that were tied round his Neck; the other talks Cherokee, is believed to be of that Nation, and was down here about a Month fince with the Chickafaw's. From this they carried him to Mr. Rae's, there beat him again, and fluck their Krives into his Body; and at last with a Hatchet chopt of his Head.'

We cannot yet inform our Readers, what is intended to be done with the Sebawanoe Indiana late-

ly taken.

The Headmen of the Lower Cherokees have been some Time in Town, and as that Part of the Nation suffered most by the War with the Creeks, they have expressed the greatest Defire for Peace; the other Chiefs are fince arrived, and all Disputes between them and the Creeks are likely to be &naily settled in a few Days.
