Extract of a Letter from Halifax, dated July 3. 1753.

—“Some Time ago, Governor Hobson sent out a small Sloop to a Place called Shedore, about 12 Leaguers Distance from hence, in order to bring up the Indians with their Squaws, according to Treaty; but these inhuman Wretches barbarously murder'd Mr. Cleveland, part Owner of the Sloop, and five others, and afterwards scalp'd them: Mr. Castile, (the Interpreter) who declared himself a Frenchman, being the only Person of the whole Crew that they sav'd alive, who arrived here last Night from Cape Breton, and acquainted us with this terrible Disaster. The Indians burnt the Sloop, and the Articles of Peace before Mr. Castile's Face, and desired him to inform his Governor of the whole Affair, upon his Arrival at Halifax. Major John Baptist Cope, was Chief, who I have often convers'd with, and always found him firmly attach'd to the English Interest; and 'tis thought the only Motive that could induce the Indians to perpetrate so cruel an Action, was the Loss of six of their People, who were murdered and scalp'd by some Persons belonging here, some Time since; and we are much afraid more innocent Men will suffer on the same Account.”

Captain Hunter from Spanish Town, Virgin Islands, in 12 Days, mentions the Arrival, at St. Thomas, of the Master of the Sloop lately mentioned to be run off with by the Crew from the River Gambia, on the Coast of Guiney, and by them afterwards run ashore to the Westward of St. Thomas: That the Crew of said Sloop had all been apprehended, and committed; but that most of them had again made their Escape: That 2 of the said Crew had however been try'd, and condemned, and were, as last Saturday Fortnight, to be executed at Tortola, Governor Purcell having erected a Gallows for that Purpose before his own Door: That Capt. Rittenie, in a Sloop of Philadelphia, was at Spanish Town: That a Rhode Island Brig was at St. Thomas: And, That on Saturday last was a Week, in Lat. 33. 70. he spoke with a Sloop belonging to Philadelphia, bound from the Bay of Honduras to Rotterdam, all well; the Captain's Name he could not hear, as they pass'd each other in a pretty rough Gale.

Letters from South Carolina, assure us, That they have a Prospect of having the largest Crop of Rice there this Season, ever known.

We are told that a Boat, coming down the North River on Thursday Evening last, had her Mast much shatter'd by the Lightning.

Extract of a Letter from Antigua, dated July 3.

“GEORGE THOMAS, Esq; our General arrived here on Sunday the 1st Instant: He landed the next Day, and was very honourably received.”

Last Thursday Twenty two Ladies of Pleasure, who were taken out of several Houses of ill Reputation in this City, were committed to the Workhouse; and next Day five of them, who could give but a poor Account of themselves, were condemn'd to receive 15 Lashes each, at the Whipping Post, which was performed accordingly, before a vast Number of Spectators, with Orders to depart the Town in Forty eight Hours after, under Pain of Imprisonment; nothing appearing against the Rest, they were dismissed.

Capt. Rash, who arrived here on Wednesday Evening last, in 24 Days from Coracoa, acquaints us, that little or nothing of Business is done in or near the Island, owing principally to the great Number of Spanish Guarda Costas, and other Vessels of Force cruising down on the Coast of Caraccas: That the Spaniards have lately taken sundry small Craft, but nothing of any considerable Value: That the two Privateers lately fitted out there were laid up, and the Crews of each discharged: And, That he sail'd in Company with Capt. Cox in a Sloop bound to Philadelphia.
