When the poor Child first beheld his Nurse, he

seem'd overjoy'd, and most movingly intreated her to take him with her; but she told him she could not then, but would quickly come for him, and take him away. She immediately applied to the proper Officers, who got a Warraut for the Father, and he was by Juftice Birch last Saturday committed to the House of Correction, and the Child fent to the Workhouse to be taken Care of. The Mother is absconded."
