From the LONDON MAGAZINE, for July.  
News for One Hundred Years hence in the Jewish  
Journal.

Since our last arrived a Mail from Jerusalem.

**T**HE middle Arch of the Temp'e,  
which has been rebuilding for some  
Time past, sunk ten Feet, a few Days  
since; and we hear, that there is now  
five and twenty Ton Weight laid up-  
on it: And it is further said, there will be a Lot-  
tery in Great-Britain (or Judaea Nova) for the  
more vigorous Execution of this grand Design, and  
Mr. Jacob Zerobabel is set out for the British  
Court; with proper Instructions how to act in this  
Affair.

Yesterday Morning Lord Jacob de Paiba set out  
for his Seat at Sion House, with a grand Retinue,  
attended by several of the Nobility and Gentry;  
and we hear that his Lordship intends continuing in  
the Country to celebrate the Passover.

On Wednesday last died, at his Grace the Duke  
of Hebron's, in Berkshire, Sir Nadab Isachar, At-  
torney General. He was esteemed a sound Law-  
yer, an able Politician, and a Friend to the San-  
hedrim: He is to be succeeded in his Office by  
Moses de Costa, Esq; of Lincoln's Inn.

On Monday last a Dispensation passed the Great  
Seal to enable Abraham Levy to hold a Living in  
the Synagogue of P—', together with the  
Rectorry of the Rabbi in the Diocese of Litchfield.

Last Week twenty five Children were publicly  
circumcised at the Lying-in Hospital in Brownlow-  
Street.

The same Day John Hartwell, Shoemaker, was  
whipped round Duke's Place, for speaking in dis-  
respectful Terms of the coming of the Messiah.

On Tuesday last was held a Court of Aldermen,  
when it was unanimously voted, that the Name of  
Liveries, which was heretofore made Use of in  
the City of London, should for the Time to come  
be obliterated, and that the said Liveries be called  
Tribes for the future.

We are also informed that the Statue of Sir  
John Barnard, formerly Father of this City, and a  
frenuous Assessor of Christianity, is ordered to  
be taken down, and that of Pontius Pilate to be  
put in his Room.

Last Night the Bill for naturalizing Christians  
was thrown out of the Sanhedrim by a very great  
Majority.

Yesterday was launched at Woolwich the Ben-  
jamin Salvadore, being the largest Ship ever built  
at that Place, and she is immediately to be fitted  
out for the Mediterranean, and it is said, the  
Board of Admiralty have given the Command of  
her to Rear Admiral Susslo.

This Day was republished Christianity not  
founded upon Argument, and we hear, a Statue is  
to be erected in Westminster Abbey to the Memo-  
ry of the Author.

Last Week was brought up to Newgate, under  
a strong Guard, George Britton, the outlawed  
Smuggler, who was taken on the Coast of Sussex,  
in the very Act of running Post into this King-  
dom, in Defiance of the many Penal Laws enacted  
to prohibit the same.

On Wednesday last 17 Malefactors were execu-  
ted at Tyburn, pursuant to their Sentence, among  
whom were Bryan Macmanus and Thady O Sui-  
hvan, born of honest Parents in the Kingdom of  
Ireland, where they were unhappily educated in  
the Errors of the Christian Religion, to which they  
were bigotted to the last, and chose to lay down  
their Lives rather than be curtailed of the Honour  
of their Ancestors by the Act of Circumcision.

We can assure the Public, that the Report so in-  
doctrinously spread by the Galileans, of the Christi-  
ans rising in North Wales, is entirely without  
Foundation.

Last Thursday being the Day appointed by the

great Sanhedrim, for commemorating the Expo-  
sition of the Christians out of Great-Britain, Sir Ga-  
briel Lombroso, Knt. Lord Mayor of the City of  
London, went to the Synagogue of Paul's, and  
heard an excellent Sermon preached upon the Oc-  
casion, by Mr. Alvaringo, of the Sect of the Pha-  
risees.

Monday last his Grace the Duke of Samaria  
took the Diversion of Hunting in Richmond Park.

We hear from Scotland, that several Highlan-  
ders in the Neighbourhood of Aberdeen assemb'ed,  
in order to practice the Superstition of the Gali-  
leans; but a Party of Soldiers being detached from  
the next Fort, they were prevented from proceed-  
ing, by being all shot dead on the Spot.—We  
hope this wholesome Correction will deter those  
bigotted People from attempting any Violations of  
the Law for the future.

Last Sunday an Order came from the Lord  
C—n's Office to the Managers of both Thea-  
tres, forbidding them, under the severest Penalties,  
to exhibit a certain scandalous Piece, highly injuri-  
ous to our present happy Establishment, entituled,  
The Merchant of Venice.

St. JOHN'S, in Antigua, August 31.

**W**E have Advice, That a Schooner from this  
Port, James Knott Commander, who drove  
to Leeward of her Destination, and put into Port-a-  
Spaniard, in the Island of Trinidad, where the Cap-  
tain went on Shore, and obtained Permission from the  
Governor, to Wood, Water, and load with Fustick.  
About the 20th of June last, three Spaniards, who  
had dined with the Master the Day before, took the  
Advantage of his Absence with his Boat and three  
Men, and accompanied by 8 Indians in a Pettiauger;  
went to the Schooner, drove the unsuspecting, disce-  
less Englishmen, 6 in Number, down the Hold, cut  
ber Cable, and were making off, when a St. Thomas  
Sloop of Force, at Anchor at a small Distance;  
perceiving this treacherous Transaction, immediately  
weighed, chased them, and, as soon as she began to  
fire, the Spaniards and Indians jump'd into their  
Pettiauger, quitted the Schooner, and row'd ashore.  
The Sloop's Boat and 6 of her Hands were left  
behind, they thought fit to put to Sea with the  
Schooner, which had her own Men only and little  
Ballast on board, where they kept Company 'til with-  
in View of the Granadas, when the Schooner being  
far to Leeward, they lost Sight of her in bad Wea-  
ther, and she has not been heard of since. Capt.  
Knott, after his Vessel was rescued, saw and spoke  
to the very Fellows who had so basely treated him,  
when they pretended to excuse themselves, by saying,  
that they did not hurt the Men, nor rife the Schoo-  
ner; kindly invited him to their Dwellings, offer'd  
him Cloaths, and desired him to accept of their good  
Offices during his Stay among them; all which he  
prudently refused. He afterwards got to St. Thomas,  
where he met the Captain that had so timely suc-  
cour'd his Schooner, who gave him the above Par-  
ticulars, and suppos'd that she must have gone to  
Coracoa or Jamaica.

Last Wednesday arrived here a Schooner from Ter-  
tela, with two Men in Irons, who were imprison'd  
there by Governor Purcell, for some piratical Pro-  
ceedings on board the Sloop Nancy, William Shearer  
Master, last from the River Gambia, and are now  
confined here in order for their Trial. The eldest  
is Robert Douglass, Boatswain, aged about 30 Years,  
who says he was born, and has a Family, in Rhode-  
Island; the other John Ellis, born in London, who  
seems about 19 Years old. 'Tis said, that after the  
Sloop was run ashore on Norman's Island, the then  
Commander found Means of selling Part of the Car-  
go for Cash, and afterwards, with all the Crew,  
except these two Men, made the best of his Way for  
St. Domingo; to the Governor of which Place Mr.  
Purcell has sent a Dispatch, demanding their Bodies;  
which, it is said, he will readily comply with.—  
As these who are apprehended, prevaricate much in  
their Story, and our Readers are fond of mere Con-  
jectures in Affairs of so great Importance, we forbear  
to enlarge upon these iniquitous Practices, 'til it can  
be done with more Certainty. NEW
