View and Examine, all Tobacco brought to any Public Warebouse, or Warehouses, where you are appointed to be Inspector, and all other Tobacco awhich you shall be called upon to View and Inspect; and that you will not receive any Tobacco that is not, in your Judgment, Sound, Well conditioned, Merchantable, and clear of Traß; nor Receive, Pass, or Stamp, any Tobacco, or Hagsbead, Cask, or Case of Tobacco, probibited by an AB of Assembly, entituled, An AB for amending the Staple of Tobacco, for preventing Frauds in his Majety's " Customs, and for the Limitation of Officers Peers and that you will Receive, Pass, and Stamp, all Tebacco that is Sound, Well conditioned, Merchantable, and clear of Trass, and in all Things well and faithfully discharge your Duty, in the " Office of an Inspector, according to the best of your "Skill and Judgment, and according to the Direction on of the faid AR, without Fear, Favour, Affellion, Malice, or Partiality."
