LETTERS from Bastia of the 22d past, re-
tract that M. Matra had put to Death
the Person who murdered M. Gafforio
in Corsica, and say, that the Murderers
had made their Escape, and, it was con-
jectured, had taken Refuge in some Place of
the Republic's Dominions on the Terra Firma; and
that the Chief of the Malecontents have had a
Meeting on this Occasion, in which it was agreed
to put a Stop to the Treaty for an Accommodation
between the Republic and them, until they deliver
up the Murderers into their Hands. As yet the
Malecontents have not made Choice of a Person to
succeed Gafforio in the chief Command. Doctor
Guiliani, who was General of the Province of Ba-
lagna, is under Arrest in the Place called Corti,
situated in the Middle of the Island. The Rebels
are at Discord, and in great Confusion amongst
themselves, massacring each other, notwithstanding
their Magistrates endeavour to restrain them, by
destroying the Houses and Effects of those who are
guilty of those Excesses. It is said the Republic
has found Means to pacify the People who were in
Arms against the Inhabitants of La Colle, by which
Means those Territories are in perfect Tranquility.

Florence, Nov. 30. Yesterday the Regency
caused an Edict to be published, prohibiting, for
the future, all Kind of Show and Expence in ma-
king of Nuns, which used to be carried to great
Excess. Orders of the same Nature were publish'd
last Month at Rome, the chief View of which, in
both Places, seems to be that of preventing or at
least lessening the Number of young Women who
might make themselves Nuns, many of whom were
allured purely by the Pomp made for them on that
Occasion. The Pope, with the same View, very
lately fixed the Age for Girls to embrace that Life,
to that of eighteen Years, which before was fre-
quently performed at an Age when they were inca-
pable of judging for themselves.

Frankfort, Dec. 11. The many Robberies and
Outrages that have of late been committed in this
City, has occasioned the Magistrates to give pub-
lic Notice, that all Persons whatsoever, who shall
be found at Night in the Streets without a Lan-
thorn or other Light, after the usual Hour of the
Drum's beating, shall be severely punished.

Genna, Dec. 7. A Felucca that arrived here
from Bastia the 5th Instant, has brought Letters
which contain nothing else but Accounts of the
Confusion, Depredations and Murders committed
by the several Factions into which the Malecon-
ter's of that Island are split.

Hague, Jan. 9. We hear from Emmerick, that
one Half of the Town has been laid under Water,
and that it would have been totally overflowed
were it not for a Dyke raised in haste in the Middle
of the Old Market, or, more properly speaking,
had not the adjacent Dykes given way, particularly
at Hatem and Leuven; for then Part of the Waters
of the Rhine flowing rapidly through those Breach-
es, the Town of Emmerick was left dry. But this
Accident, which has saved the Inhabitants of Em-
merick, has ruined Thousands in all the circumja-
cent Places. The Districts of Lymers, Latum,
Doerburgh, &c. are totally overflowed. At Leu-
ven the Parsonage House has been carried away by
the Floods, and the Minister, with his Sitter, and
a Maid Servant, perished in the Waters.

A charitable Lady, commiserating the poor In-
habitants of the Province, where the Inundations
have done so much Damage, has distributed 6000
Florins amongst them; and several other Persons
appear inclined to follow so generous an Example.

Hague, Jan. 10. The Letters we receive from
Overissel dwell upon nothing but the Progress of
the Inundation in that Province, and the melan-
choly Condition of the Country round Deventer,
Zwol, and Campen, occasion'd by the Breach of
almost all the Dykes. We have likewise received
sad Accounts from the District of Weluwe.

Copenhagen, Dec. 25. A few Days ago a Fire
broke out in the Manufactory for Broad Cloths,
lately set up by Count Molcke, Grand Marshal of
the Court, on his Estate at Bregentwedt; by which
the Edifice, and all the Utensils, were entirely
consumed.

Eisenach, Dec. 27. A few Days ago a Fire
broke out in the Tower of the House where Cri-
mina's are usually confined, and made so rapid a Pro-
gress, that the whole Building was reduced to Ashes,
and most of the Prisoners perished in the Flames.

Hanover, Dec. 31. Melancholy Accounts come
from all Parts, of the Damages done by the over-
flowing of the Rivers in this Electorate.

Archangel, Nov. 4. We are here in the utmost
Confusion imaginable. A violent Storm rose in
the Evening of the 27th ult. which continued all
Night. In the mean Time a Fire broke out and
burnt with such Rapidity it is scarce possible to ex-
press; it will be best comprehended by it's dreadful
Effects, which, from a careful Inspection, appears
to be six Hundred and nine Houses, including those
demolished, nine Hundred Seventy four; two Hun-
dred and thirty Warehouses and Shops, fourteen
Mills, eleven public Manufactories, a public Bath,
three vast Baking Houses, seven Taverns, and a
Salt Work. The Loss is immense, but not calculat-
ed as yet.

Vienna, Nov. 13. Last Week was dispatched
to Moscow, a Courier, whose Letters relate to the
new Treaty proposed to that Court and ours, for
jointly forming in case of Disturbance, an Army of
120,000 Men; this Army is to be at the Command
of the British Court and its Allies, and to act as
Circumstances may require, in the Assistance of any
Power who is a Party in the Alliance. This Trea-
ty is soon to be signed at Moscow.

Madrid, Nov. 6. The Court having taken into
Consideration Mr. Keene's Remonstrances, con-
cerning the English Vessel lately brought into Ma-
laga by the Eagle Man of War, have ordered its
immediate Release without any Charges; upon
which Mr. Keene has waited on his Majesty with
Thanks, and intimated to a chief Minister, that it
would not be only in the Parts of Old Spain where
Equity was to take Place.

Constantinople, Dec. 4. Within these few Days
the Plague has broke out in this City, but as the
Weather begins to grow cold, we hope the Conta-
gion will make no great Progress.

L O N D O N.

Extract of a Letter from Amsterdam, December 11.

According to some Letters from Lisbon, the
Knight of Malta who went lately to that Court to
solicit his most Faithful Majesty's Mediation in
the Difference between the Order of Malta and the
King of the Two Sicilies, relates, that in passing
through Spain he saw nothing but Misery among
the Inhabitants of that Monarchy, oppressed with
Taxes without Number, and deprived of all the
Resources to be found in Trade, which is wholly
engrossed by the King. But by Means of this
Monopoly his Catholic Majesty has his Coffer
running over, his Land Forces numerous, and his
Fleet formidable. In short, this Monarch is the
richest Merchant that ever sent a Ship to Sea. He
has Correspondents in all Parts, and Bankers in e-
very great trading Town in Europe. The first
Part of his System, which consists in invading the
Trade of his Subjects, may turn to his Disadvan-
tage; but the Article of the Banks under the im-
mediate Direction of his Commissaries, must be ex-
tremely profitable to him.

The Letters from Lisbon add, that there is a
great Misunderstanding between the Court of Por-
tugal and certain Merchants or Factors, who have
been long settled in that Kingdom; and that this
Misunderstanding was occasioned by some Practices
of the Merchants which the Portuguese Court, and
Nation think unfair. The Merchants pretend that
the Prerogatives enjoyed by them in Trade from
Time immemorial have been infringed, and that
unless Things are put on the former Footing, it

will be impossible for them to import the Commo-
dities of their Country, as they can get only a
small Profit by them, or perhaps will be obliged to
sell them under prime Cost. We are assured that
a Negotiation is actually on foot for accommodating
this Difference, and for establishing a new Regu-
lation for the Time to come.

The Republic's Ambassador to the French
King, who lately made a Tour to the Hague, has
received from the States General some new In-
structions in Relation to the Renewal of the Tariff
between France and their High Mightinesses; to
which Affairs great Attention is paid, as that Trade
is the most important Branch of our Foreign Com-
merce.

Extract of a Letter from Merthin Maw in Wales,
December 18.

A French Ship called the Vainiver, bound
from Lisbon to Havre de Grace, the Master John
Maffon, of Diepe in Normandy, loaded with 850
Chests of China Oranges, 14 Chests of Lemons, 650
Frais of Figs, 84 Planks of Brazil Wood, was
unfortunately cast away on Wednesday last, at a
Place called Skerr, near Newton in this County.
The Master, his Ma'e, his Brother, and a Passen-
ger, were drowned, and eight saved. The Coun-
try made a perfect Wreck of the Ship and Cargo,
Rigging, &c. As to the Fruit, no good could be
expected from them, as the Chests were all torn to
Pieces, and the Fruit scattered along the Coast for
a Mile together. The Plank I believe, I shall be
able to recover, as they are in the Neighbourhood,
and Part of the Rigging. There was a severe Act
passed last Session of Parliament with regard to
Wrecks, but it has not reached us as yet.

Nov. 28 Yesterday between Eleven and Twelve
at Noon, died the Right Honourable Edward Iron-
side, Esq; Lord Mayor of this City, to the Uni-
versal Concern of his Fellow Citizens, his Life be-
ing uniform in the Exercise of every Virtue. His
Heart was at all Times fortified against Corruption;
and his Abilities exerted in the Service of the Pub-
lic. Under the most intense Pain the true Christian
was apparent; and with the greatest Calmness and
Resignation he embraced his approaching Change.

Dec. 1. A young Gentleman, Son of an emi-
nent Merchant of this City, came home to his Fa-
ther's House between Twelve and One o'Clock
last Wednesday Morning, and ordered the Servant
who sat up for him, to make a good Fire in his Bed
Chamber, and then go to Bed, and strictly ordered
not to be disturbed on any Account 'till Eleven
o'Clock; at which Hour the Servant went to call
him, and after knocking at his Chamber-door for
a considerable Time, in vain, he acquainted his
Master with it, and that he was fearful some
Misfortune had befallen his Son, on which the Door
being forced open, the melancholy Scene presented
itself to their View, of the unhappy Youth lying
on the Floor, with his Throat cut almost from Ear
to Ear; and a Letter was found upon the Table,
wrote in the most moving Style to his Father, ac-
quainting him with the Cause of his melancholy
Catastrophe: The Purport of which was, That he
was unwarily drawn in to go to a Hazard Table,
kept at a House near Covent Garden, where he had
lost a considerable Sum of Money of his Father's.

Jan. 1. A Fire broke out in the Old Seraglio
at Constantinople in the Afternoon of the third of
November, which continued burning when the Post
came away.

The Utrecht Gazette informs us, that the Affair
of Dunkirk still takes up the Attention of our Court,
as it appears by the last Letters from the Earl of
Aibemarle, that the French Court persists in pro-
tending to a Right to make what Works she pleases
on the Land Side for the Safety of that important
Place.
