**HANOVER, January 1.**  
**B**Y the last Post, Orders are come from  
England to recruit all the Regiments of  
Horse and Dragoons in this Electorate by  
the End of April. We flattered ourselves  
with the Hopes of seeing his Britannic  
Majesty, but the Letters mention positively that he  
will not pass the Sea this Year.

**Paris, Jan. 7.** It is generally believed the Par-  
liament will be recalled, impt of the Members of  
that Great Chamber having Leave to come and pass  
their Winter here.

**Naples, Dec. 21.** The Officers of the Police,  
who were charged to execute the Edict for prohibi-  
ting of Gaming, acquit themselves with all Punc-  
tuality, having lately surprized six Lords in the  
Milan Coffee house, who in Contempt of his Ma-  
jesty's Orders were at Play, whom they arrested  
and carried Prisoners to the Castle of L'Oeuf,  
where they are still detained.

**Stockholm, Jan. 1.** It is certain that Orders  
are arrived for building several Ships of War and  
Frigates, for the Service of the Courts of France  
and Spain. Our Town-House has been lately  
consumed by Fire; but the Archives that were  
preserved there were scdded and removed in Time.

**Warsaw, Dec. 29.** Upon Advice that several  
Parties of the Heildamiques were approached the  
Frontiers of this Kingdom, a large Party of the  
Crown Army were sent against them, and have  
not only had the good Fortune to disperse them,  
but even to fabre a great Number of them, and  
take thirty Prisoners.

**Madrid, Jan. 1.** The Marquis de Crux, Go-  
vernour of Ceuta, has dispatched a Courier to the  
King, to acquaint his Majesty, that the 17th of  
last Month, in the Night, six Companies of Gre-  
nadiers, and fourteen Picquets of the Garrison of  
that Place, had made a Sally. The Detachment,  
being divided into three Bodies, under the Com-  
mand of Don Joseph de St. Just, Don Joseph de  
Guever, and Don Mid'Ugalde, Colonels of the  
Regiments of Cordouna, Ceuta and Navarre, at-  
tack'd the Camp of the Moors in three Places,  
and kill'd 120 of them. Some of the Moors set  
Fire to their Huts, and above 100 more perished  
in the Flames. On the Side of the Spaniards only  
a Sergeant of Grenadiers was slightly wounded.  
Our Men destroy'd Part of the Enemy's Works,  
and brought to Ceuta seven Women, fourteen  
Children, and 454 Head of Cattle.

**Hague, Jan. 23.** Some private Letter, from  
Spain say, that the Inquisition have discovered a  
great Number of Mohammedans, and by Permif-  
sion of the King; have sentenced them to be tran-  
ported to America, where they are to work in the  
Mines during Life. Our Letters from Italy give  
some Hopes that the Troubles in Colchis will at  
length have an End. They write from Rouen,  
that through the wise Precautions of the Parliament,  
and through the Blessings of Almighty God, an  
entire Stop has been put to the Epidemic Distemper,  
which reigned there.

**Paris A-la-main, January 14.** We learn from  
Genoa, that the Rebels in Corsica continue greatly  
enraged against the Genoese, and have determined  
to form themselves into two considerable Bodies,  
one of which is to go into Balagne, and the other  
into the Province of Nebbio, in order, either by  
fair Means or foul, to bring over to their Party the  
Families that have left it, and to endeavour to re-  
concile the Minds of the People, that they may  
write in the Protection of their Country against any  
Attempts which the Genoese may make to oppress  
them, ever persisting in their Resolution to be  
eternally at War with the Republic, till the seven  
principal Persons concerned in the Murder of their  
General, Gafforio, are delivered up to them.

**Naples, Jan. 1.** Orders are issued for raising six  
new Battalions, which will augment our Army to  
between 40 and 45000 Men; 10,000 of which  
Number will be kept in Readiness to march where-  
ever Occasion may require.

**Naples, Jan. 3.** Sr James Gray, Envoy Ex-  
traordinary from the King of Great Britain, had a  
few Days ago a private Audience of our Sovereign,  
and presented his Credentials; since which he has  
had a Conference with the Marquis Fogliani, Se-  
cretary of State, to whom he declared, That his  
Britannic Majesty being extremely desirous to  
cement the good Understanding between him and  
the Crown of the Two Sicilies for the Advantage  
of their respective Subjects, had accepted the Pro-  
posal made by the Prince de San Severino, the  
King's Minister at London, for a Treaty of Com-  
merce between the two Courts; and that he was  
charged with Instructions relative to this Point, as  
well as to the Grand Object of preserving Peace  
in Italy.

**Rome, Jan. 5.** Some Corsicans who had a  
Hand in the Murder of Gafforio, are arrived here,  
and relate strange Stories concerning the Motives  
and Conduct of themselves and their Accomplices:  
Among other Things they give us to understand,  
that Gafforio's own Brother was bribed by the  
Genoese to dispatch him, and that the Reward of  
his Parricide was to be a Pension of two thousand  
Livres.

**Lighorn, Jan. 5.** We have Advice from Tunis  
that there are eighteen Chebeks, or armed Barks,  
at Sea from that Port, the least of which carries  
100 Men.

**Genoa, Jan. 5.** The Master of a Pink arrived  
here from Barcelona reports, that two Days before  
he sail'd a great Firing was heard at Sea; and as  
they had Intelligence that nine Algerine Chebeks  
were on the Coast, the Marquis de la Mina,  
Captain General of the Province, immediately  
ordered three Men of War, one of 70, and two of  
60 Guns, who had just entered the Harbour, to  
put to Sea again; and that these Ships having  
steered to that Part from whence the Noise came,  
the Firing became much brisker, and continued  
from three in the Afternoon till next Morning,  
without their being able to learn the Issue of it.  
Another Master of a Vessel who is just arrived,  
tells us that three of the Chebeks were sunk, and  
two taken; and that the others escaped with much  
Difficulty.

**Genoa, Jan. 4.** We have Advice from the  
Coast of Barbary that the Plague is quite ceased  
at Algiers.

**Brussels, Jan. 17.** We learn from Meptz, that  
by Order of the Court, Monsieur the Intendants of  
the three Bishopricks, had issued Circular Letters  
to the several Chiefs and Syndicks of each respec-  
tive City, Town and Village within their Jurisdic-  
tion, to send to him within the Course of this  
Month, an exact Account of the Number of Horses  
which are to be found in their respective Districts.  
Tis said that the Intendants of many other Pro-  
vinces have issued the like Orders. The Report in  
some of the Frontier Towns of France is, that  
several Regiments garrisoned in Flanders and  
Alsace, will begin to move towards Dauphiny  
and Provence in March next.

**Hague, Dec. 15.** We learn by an Express just  
arrived, that the first Accounts of the terrible Fire  
at Moscow, were but too true. The greatest Part  
of the new Palace is burnt to the Ground, with an  
imense Quantity of rich Furniture; the Ward-  
robes of the Grand Duke, of the High Chancellor,  
the Count de Bestucheff, the Vice Chancellor,  
Count Woranzoff, and several other Ministers, to  
a prodigious Value. The Fire at Archangel  
destroyed, in Goods and Merchandize of different  
Kinds, to the Value of two Millions of Rubles;  
the Loss in both Places has fallen entirely upon  
the Russians; for the Foreigners, having taken  
the Precaution to build with Stone, escaped.

**Naples, Dec. 21.** Forty Thousand Ducats have  
been brought this Year into the Royal Treasury as  
a Tax upon the Game of Hazard; Nobody daring  
to play without paying a Duty.

**Vicenza, Dec. 22.** The Count of Firmian, Am-  
bassador for this Court to the King of the two

Sicilies, is set out for Naples, and we are assured  
his chief Business is to assure his Majesty of the  
strong Desire of the Empress Queen to preserve the  
Peace of Italy, and to set in Concert with him to  
procure such a laudable Design.

**Paris, Dec. 8.** The Chancellor having sent for  
the Members of the Chatelet, spoke to them in  
these Words: "Gentlemen, the King will be  
obey'd, and he must be so. His Chatelet will  
force him to recal the Parliament whom he has  
thought proper to exile. The King is obliged to  
render Justice to all his Subjects; with this View he  
has appointed a Royal Chamber, to which he  
expects an entire and universal Submission. His  
Majesty releases you from the Oath upon which  
you have insisted so much, and will receive no far-  
ther Representations from you."

**Genoa, Jan. 17.** A Body of French Troops is  
assembling in Languedoc, Provence, and Dauphiny,  
where they are to lie in Readiness to march into Ita-  
ly, in Case the Court of France should find it necessa-  
ry to have any Hand in the Affairs transacting in  
that Country.

**Paris, Jan. 25.** The Court has sent Orders to  
Toulon for a considerable Squadron to be got ready,  
which, tis assured, is designed to act against the  
Algerines. The old Bishop de Mirepoix lies at the  
Point of Death.

**Hague, Jan. 28.** It is confirmed, that the ne-  
cessary Measures are already taken for rebuilding all  
the Fleet belonging to the Republic, and to put them  
in as formidable a Condition as formerly.

**Dublin, Jan. 15.** Last Saturday, about Four  
o'Clock in the Afternoon, the Ship Beaver, John  
Hamilton, Commander, laden with Flax-steed, Rum,  
and Pipe-staves, about 200 Tons Burthen, frant  
Philadelphia for this Port, struck on the Bank of  
Malabide, by the Master's mistaking, in the thick  
bad Weather Lambay Island for the Hill of Howth;  
and would probably have continued there till she beat  
to Pieces, but for the great Care of Mr. John  
Adamsen, Surveyor of Malabide, who immediately  
went on board, supplied the Master with the wheel  
Crew of the King's Barge, and hired another Set  
of Men for him on Shore, by which Means she was  
got safe off.

**Jan. 19.** Yesterday the Right Hon. Thomas Car-  
ter, Esq; Master of the Rolls, Anthony Maloney,  
Esq; his Majesty's Prime Serjeant at Law, and  
Michael O Brian Dilkes, Esq; Quarter Master and  
Barrack Master General, were dismissed from their  
Employments; and Bellingham Boyle, Esq; Register  
of the Prerogative Court, had his Pension stop'd.

**Dec. 22.** Yesterday there was a Court at St.  
James's and a Drawing Room, at which were pre-  
sent a great Number of Nobility and Gentry, a-  
mong whom was the Hon. George Clinton, Esq;  
late Governour of New York, who was received by  
his Majesty and the Royal Family with great Ap-  
probation.

**Jan. 3.** Tis reported that the Right Honour-  
able the Earl of Chesterfield will be desired to accept  
of the Post of Lord Lieutenant of Ireland.

Our last Letters from Hamburgh inform us, that  
it was currently reported there the Conferences be-  
tween the Swedish and Russian Ministers, in respect  
to the Limits of their Dominions in Finland, are in-  
terrupted, and that there were some Apprehensions  
of a Misunderstanding arising thereupon between  
the Courts of Petersburg and Stockholm.

**Jan 5.** The Vessel lost off Boulogne, laden with  
Pitch and Tar, proves to be the Dove, Airson,  
from Carolina.

**Jan 8.** We are informed that the following  
Men of War will speedily sail for the East Indies,  
viz. the Kent, Salisbury, Eagle, Bristol, a 20 Gun  
Ship, and a Sloop.

They write from Mokow, that secret Councils of
