T the Seffions of the High Court of Admiralty, held at Justice Hall in the Admirately, need at Justice Hall in the Old Bailey, on the twelty-fifth of February, John Lancey, and John Lleydy were indicated for unlawfully burning and defiroying the Ship Nightheyale, Thomas Benjiddion of the Admirately of England, with Intention to defraud Robert, Liddal, Samuel Touchet, George Rosk, and Vinitate Bifcos 1, and Thomas Powing Page as an Accoffery before the Fact for otherwise Per, as an Accessary before the Fact, for counfelling, advising, Act, to commit the fame, duraft the 4th, 1752.

Richard Sennett.
