Robins, &c. are found dead. The Shingles,
and Clapboards of some Houses split and shiver'd
to Pieces. The Hail Stones were the largest ever
known, being in Plenty as big as Hen's Eggs, ma-
ny equal to Goose Eggs, and some measuring from
2 and a half to 3 Inches Diameter—of all possi-
ble Sizes and Figures—extremely solid and as
transparent as any fresh Water Ice, froze in a still
cold January Night. 'Twas impossible for any
Man exposed to its full Fury to have surviv'd, for
it fell with such prodigious Force that Hogs were
knock'd down, and lay as dead for some Time,
and Apples no bigger than Musket Balls split, one
half left on its Stem, and the other half carried off.
The Hail lay Yesterday in Rye, Spratham, and in
this Place, in Valleys a Foot and a half and two
Feet deep—And in many Places several Bushels
may be gather'd up this Morning, tho' the Weather
has been very warm ever since. This severe Squall
was attended with heavy Thunder, and plentiful
Rain—the Lightning struck and shiver'd to Pic-
ces a Well Pole at Portsmouth, and a Sloop's Mast
at Newcastle—Two Miles South of us there was
no Rain, and to the North of us no Hail, but
plentiful Rain, and very severe Thunder and
Lightning: It continued in its full Force for half
an Hour.

NEW-YORK, June 24.
A Gentleman from Albany, who came to Town
fate our last, informs us, That his Honour our Go-
verner arrived in that City on Thursday last was a
Week, and was received with the greatest Demon-
strations of Joy and Satisfaction by the Inhabitants of
that City and County; their Militia being very re-
gularly drawn up, and their Fort, and several Black
Houses Artillery, firing upon his Arrival. The Com-
missioners from the neighbouring Provinces arrived
in two Days after, in as good Health as the Fatigue
of their Passage by Water could admit.
The Indians of the several different Tribes design'd
to form the Congress the 14th Instant, were not come
down to Albany the Day appointed, owing, 'tis said,
to 1 of their Sachems having died on or about that Day
12 Months, and their then being busy with the Ce-
remonyes customary among them, so long a Time after
the Death of such Personages: They however were
to be in Albany the Monday after, being the 17th
Instant.

ANNAPOLIS.
