**N E W Y O R K.**

November 4. Capt. Burrows arrived here Yesterday Week, from the Havannah, in 24 Days, gives us the following Intelligence, viz. That on the 28th of April last he sailed from Coracoa, in the Sloop Polly, belonging to Philadelphia, bound to Georgia, and on the 21st of May following, in a strong N. E. Gale, he was forced on a Ledge of Rocks called Cajo Romano, about 22 Leagues from Porto Prince, on the Island of Cuba: That after the Vessel struck, himself, together with his Owner, Mr. Griffiths, of Philadelphia, and Crew, finding it impossible to save her, quitted her, and got safe on Shore in the Long Boat: That a Schooner from Porto Prince bound to the Havannah, put into the Place where they landed three Days after, and refused to carry them down, but left a Pilot to convey them to Porto Prince: That in their Way, to that Place, the Pilot under Pretence of keeping their Boat afloat at Times when they landed, at length pushed her off in earnest, and left the Englishmen entirely destitute of Suttenance, what little they had being on board: That four Days after, observing his Boat at a Distance, he made a float of Logs and went to her, when the Spaniard endeavoured to excuse himself for leaving them so abruptly, and assured them of being safely convoy'd to Porto Prince, where they arrived soon after, and were ordered to close Confinement, being first strip'd of all their Cloaths, and allow'd but little or no Provisions: That they remain'd in that Condition ten Weeks, when they were removed to the Havannah, and there again put in Goal: That Mr. Griffiths and himself were soon after examined before the Governor and ordered to Lodgings; and that the former had commenc'd an Action at the Havannah against the Governor of Porto Prince, for the Detention of 391 Pistoles which he deposited in his Hands for its better Security; and which he assured Mr. Griffiths to return upon Demand, but refused, alledging, That as the Pistoles were Spanish, he intended to make the Property likewise such:—That the Governor of the Havannah promised to use his Endeavours for the Recovery of the Money; and that Mr. Griffiths died soon after through the Fatigue and ill Usage he had met with. Capt. Burrows's Crew were afterwards releas'd.

On Saturday last his Majesty's Letters Patent, passed the Great Seal, incorporating certain Persons by the Name of the *Governors of the College of the Province of New York, in the City of New York, in America*; and empowering them to make, "Such Laws, Ordinances and Orders, for the better Government of the said College and Students, and Ministers thereof, as they shall think best for the general Good of the same, so that they are not repugnant to the Laws and Statutes of that Part of the Kingdom of Great Britain, called England, or of the said Province of New York; and do not extend to exclude any Person, of any religious Denomination whatever, from equal Liberty and Advantage of Education, or from any the Degrees, Liberties, Privileges, Benefits or Immunities of the said College, on Account of his particular Tenets in Matters of Religion."

At the Desire of several of our Readers, we have given the Public the Perusal of thus much of this Charter, hoping it may remove the Prejudices that have been industriously instilled into the Minds of some People, against a Work so apparently calculated for the Benefit of Persons of every religious Denomination, and so consistent with our happy Constitution.

**PHILADELPHIA, October 31.**

On Sunday last arrived in this City, a young Woman, aged about 19 Years. The Account she gives of herself is, That when she was about 7 Years old she was taken Prisoner, in Company with two other young Girls, by some French Indians,

at her Aunt's, whose first Name she remembers to have been Lydia, where she, with other Children, was taught to read, &c. The Indians carried her to their Village, where, after being kept about a Year, she was sold to the French. at a Place called the Three Rivers, below Quebec. That about 15 Months past, a Letter came from her Mother, which her Master kept, after he had caused it to be interpreted to her; she understood it to be dated from Philadelphia, and that her Father, whose Name she believes to be Richard Tell, was dead, and her Mother was married again to a Person whose Name she has forgot, but thinks he was a Joiner by Trade. Upon the Reception of this Letter, she made earnest Application to her Master for Leave to return to her Relations, which, after a Year's Delay, she, with Difficulty, obtained, and, by Order of the Marquis Duquesne, Governor of Montreal, whose Pass she produces to that Purport, she was conducted to Albany, where she saw the Person that had forwarded her the Letter, who told her it came from Philadelphia. She was kindly entertained at New York, from whence she produced an ample Pass, signed by the Mayor. She remembers, that before she was taken, her Father lived near some City, which, from the above mentioned Circumstances, she is inclined to believe is Philadelphia; nevertheless her Enquiry after her Relations has hitherto proved unsuccessful, from whence it is to be doubted, whether she may not be mistaken with regard to the Province she was made Prisoner from, which is not to be wondered at, considering how young she was when taken. All well disposed People are desired to make what Enquiry they can, in order to assist this unhappy Person to the Knowledge of her Friends and Relations.
