THE Congregation de Propaganda Fide have received very agreeable Accounts touching the Arrival of the Portugueze Ambassadors, who were sent to China to obtain Leave for the Catholic Missionaries to return to that vast Empire, where they have been long prohibited from setting Foot. The Ambassadors were received very graciously, and the Emperor signified to them, that he would permit the Missionaries to come from Macao to preach the Gospel in any Part of his Dominions.
