SINCB speaking to you at the Opening of the Sessions, I have received a Letter from Sir I bemai Robinson, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, signifying to me his Majesty's express Commands, that I should not only act with Vigour, in Defence of the Governments under my Care, but should assist his Majesty's other Colonies to repel any hostile Attempts made against them. This Letter I now lay before you, and hope, when you have maturely confidered the Nature and Importance of the Service recommended to me, you will, as becomes dutiful Subjects to the best of Kings, and careful Guardians of your Country's Safety, exert yourselves upon the present Occasion, and enable me to testify my Duty to his Majesty, and Love to this Country, by acting up to the Royal Expectations, so warmly expressed in the Secretary of State's Letter.

His going about for fach Ends, 'tis thought, would have a greater Influence to fet the People against a Popish Government, than all the Books and Pampliets fince the Revolution.
