**I arrived here three Days ago, after a tedious ne, occasioned by the large Train I was with, session of the Whale Bosts, and the Bayes. afifting of 200 Whale-Boats, and 200 Battoes, which are here now fafe, with their Cargoes, cepting two Whale-Boats, and two Battoes, that re loft at the Falls, twelve Miles from hence, d four Men drowned in them. On my Arrival heard, that a few Days before, a Party of Inans came on some Ship Carpenters cutting Tim-r not 300 Yards from the Town, and before a crty could be turned out, killed and carried off welve: They were purfued by the Party, but ey could not get Sight of them: Our People und one killed, which they scalped, and threw s Body into the River, besides several Blankets ot thro', Knives, Muskets, &c. by which it is ought fome more of the Enemy have been killed. bout 8 o'Clock this Day, we heard a firing up e River, which we took to be an Attack on one icutenant Blair, who went up this Morning to the Reefs, with 24 Men, two Miles off, for a duard to the Battoes at that Place; upon which fumbers of People, with a few Mohawks, ran om the Town that Way. The Firing still connued; and foon after a Man came in with an Inian Scalp, and brought Word, that Blair's Party vas attacked by a Party of French and Indians, imfelf and one Soldier killed; upon which upvards of 500 Battoe Men were fent different Ways nto the Woods. We foon further heard, that a brave Mohawk, who went out on the Alarm, with ome Battoe Men, was killed by a French Indian, fiter he (the French Indian) had received a Wound n his Thigh, the Mohawk attempting to take him dive, and by that Means he lost his Life; but a Battoe Man that stood next to him soon dispatched he French Indian, and scalped him; another they found dead, which they fcalped also; two more they are certain are killed, as they faw them drawn off. Lieutenant Blair, tho' a young Gentleman,

not more than 18 or 19, behaved like a brave Sol-dier; for being wounded the first Fire, he begged his Men to TREE ALL, and fight on, for he was a dead Man, and that they might soon expect Assistance; soon after he received another Ball in his Throat, when he immediately fell. The Ser-jeant, with the Men, bravely maintained their Ground, till they were relieved by Numbers, on whose Approach the Enemy soon made off, and the Woods being now green, our People stood no Chance in following them. Another Soldier is mortally wounded, one flightly, and a Ship-Carpenter, who went out without any Fire-Arms some Time after the Attack, was shot in the Leg, the Bone not hurt. Our People have brought in several Blankets, Knives, small Arms, &c. by which we hope they have had a warm Reception. They had not Time to scalp our Dead. Lieut. Blair, the Mohawk, and Soldier, were interred this Af-

ternoon, with all the Honours of War.
We are bufy getting the Vessels here ready for the Lake, and hope to be out in eight Days. As yet little is done to the new Ones, and will not, till we are reinforced, that we may have a strong Guard to cover our Men in the Woods. At the Falls (12 Miles from hence) a good flockaded Fort is building, to defend that Pass. Plenty of fresh Beef and Fish, the latter of which, in three Hawls of a Seine, filled a Battoe, so hope soon to have a very healthy Garrison."

General Johnson set out from the Flats the 19th Instant for Onondaga, distant from the Flats 60 Miles, there to hold, 'tis said, the most important Treaty with the Indians that has been held for fome Years past, as on the Success of it, 'tis likewise thought, the future Friendship of all the Indian Tribes will, in a great Measure, principally depend: That the General before he left the Flat spoke with some Indians there who told him, that Numbers of the French and Indians were daily gathering together at Oswegatchi, with an Intent to attack some Place thereabouts.

The famous Rogers, of Fort William Henry, has made another ments at Crown-Point, and upon his Return gave out, that he had unwarily marched with his Party fo near the Point, as to get between a Body of the Enemy, who were erecting a Battery at a few Miles Distance from the Fort, and the Point itself; that himself and Men were obliged to separate; and that he afterwards hovered about Crown-Point

where he fays he could fpy the French bufily employed in every Thing belonging to Fortification. Work, and supplying the Place with Provisions from Canada; and that he returned to get a larger Party to go back with him, in order to cut off those erecting the Battery, which he fays, he is fure of

ANNAPOLIS, June 17. Friday last arrived here, after a Passage of ten Weeks, the Ship Betsey, Capt. Richard Fitzberbert, from Briffol, with about thirteen Indented Servants.
Yesterday arrived here, from London, but last

from Terbay, the Ship Sally-Brown, Capt. John Brown, in a Passage of seven Weeks. He informs us, that General Abercrombie, with two Regiments of the Troops designed for America (who all embarked with the greatest Chearfulness and Alacrity failed the tenth of April, for New-York, under Convoy of Admiral West: And, that Lord Loudon, with more Troops, was to fail foon after him.
By an Express which came to Town Yesterday,

from New-York, we hear, that General Webb, and Major Rutberford, came Passengers in the Packet-Boat, which arrived there the seventh Instant, and that the General set off the next Day for Albary, to take the Command of his Majesty's Forces, until Lord Loudon shall arrive. We also learn, that his Majesty has been-pleased to settle on Sir William Johnson a Pension of 600 l. a Year: And that most of the sifty Foreign Officers, who are appointed to raise Men in Pennsylvania and this Province, for Lord Loudon's Regiment, agreeable to a late Act of Parliament, embarked with the two Regiments that failed the tenth of April, and are daily expected at New York.

By a Gentleman who is just returned from the North-Mountain, we are informed, that his Excellency our Governor was in Health there the 14th Inftant; that the Men raised for that Service have begun a Fort, near the Plantation on which one Johnson lately dwelt; and, that his Excellency will be obliged to give Orders for drafting fixty or feventy Men from the Militia, for the Protection of the Frontiers, agreeable to that Clause of an Act of Assembly lately made in this Province, which was printed in our Gazette, N°. 577.
