" You must know that Argria was trapanned in " a most treacherous Manner by the Maratta's, " and made their Prisoner, who have continually " threatened to cut his Head off, in order to extort " a Confession from him where his Riches lie concealed, which makes them very defirous of our " quitting the Garrison, in Hopes of possessing themselves of it; but I am fully convinced, " Admiral Watson will not leave one Stone un-" turned to find all the Treasure before he quits " the Place; and I am credibly informed, " gria has wrote privately to the Admiral, that " as he hath used his Wives and Children with " fo much Clemency and Humanity (who are " in our Possession) it would give him great Plea-" fure to be his Prisoner; and that if he would " demand him from the Maratta General, he " would discover to him where all his Riches are " conceal'd.
