By this you may be convinced how impossible it is to cover Trade, in Time of War, by any other Way than failing under Convoy; for the Privateers of France are innumerable, and their amazing Success has given them great Spinits; but it is very certain they have never behaved well in any Engagement.

" We have a fine Prospect of a plentiful Crop this Year, which will be very acceptable; for the Diffress of the Poor in England, and more particularly in Ireland, has been, and still is, very great.
