Capt. Lutwyche, was safe arrived at Falmouth.
The Gofport Man of War has taken a Schooner
Privateer of Cape-Breton, and carried her into St.
John's in Newfoundland. She had taken several
English Prizes a few Days before, some belonging
to Philadelphia.
Saturday last one John Cotes, who lately lived
at Conojohary, in Albany County, passed by here
in his Way to New-Jersey; but first gave us the
following Account, viz. That sometime last Week
there were 46 Persons carried off by the French
and Indians from the German Flats.—That Num-
bers of the (pretended) Friend Indians were seen
among the Enemy.—That the Inhabitants are most
all moving away.—And that the Enemy, it was
thought, consisted of some Hundreds, pillaging
and ravaging the Country, and captivating or
scalping all they come across, Coates himself being
one among the Fugitives.
Letters from Halifax, mention the Return of
Admiral Holbourne, with his Fleet, from Louif-
burg, where the French Fleet are still at Anchor
in the Harbour, and whose Number of great Guns
on board their Line of Battle Ships, exceed those
of the English by 158.
We also learn that the French Encampments
are quite thick all along the Sea Side, on Cape-
Breton Isle, particularly in such Places where there
was any Likelihood of landing a Body of Men,
having also several strong Batteries newly erected.
The Highland Forces are arrived at Halifax.
PHILADELPHIA, September 15.
Extra of a Letter from Falmouth, dated July 29.
"On Saturday Evening an outward bound
French East-Indiaman was brought into Plymouth,
taken by five of our Privateers.—She had only
40 Guns mounted, but was pierced for 74. A
Cartel is at last settled, and several Prisoners ex-
changed on both Sides."
In a Letter from Albany, dated the 5th of Sep-
tember, it is said, that five Days before two of our
People had come in from Ticonderoga, and in-
formed, that all the Canadians and Savages were
gone off; and that the Regulars, excepting four
Battalions, were also gone to Quebec, Montreal,
St. John's, &c. but that the Indians were expect-
ed back again some Time next Month.
Another Letter from the same Place mentions
that Captain Putman was returned from viewing
Ticonderoga, where he saw but few Tents and
Men: And that a large scouting Party of our In-
dians were gone out.
A Prize Snow, retaken, bound to Carolina from
Liverpool, is in the River. She was taken by the
Stanwix Privateer of this Port, and two Privateers
of New-York, it is said: What her Lading con-
sists of not known.
Since our last an Express arrived here from
Northampton with Advice, that two Indians had
come to Fort Allen from Diahogo, and informed,
that a little above that Place they had seen five
Frenchmen, and five French Indians, who said
they expected to be joined by twenty Indians
more; that they designed to come down to the
Minifinks a Scalping; take a View of our Forts,
and endeavour to get some Prisoners, in order to
be informed of the Strength of the Country; then
go away to Fort Johnson, and so return home with
their Intelligence to the French General. And on
Friday Morning last one James Tidd was killed
and scalped in the Minifinks by some-Indians, and
a Soldier shot in the Back, but likely to do well.
On Tuesday last the second Battalion of the
Royal Americans passed by here, on their Way to
Carlisle; the Colonel of the Battalion, Mr. Desfau,
died at New-Brunswick.

his Hand in the Face, of which he died in about
Three Quarters of an Hour. The Officer imme-
diately delivered himself up to Justice, and order-
ed a decent Burial for the Deceased.

Saturday last Richard Clark was Tried at the
Provincial Court, now sitting, for the Murder of
Benjamin White (who was about to marry his Mo-
ther) in November last; by shooting him in the
Thigh; but the Evidence against him was not full
enough to Convict him, and he was Acquitted.
