You will, I doubt not, believe, that I consulted the Ease and Inclination of your Constituents, when I made this Representation; and I hope it will determine his Lordship to order only One Regiment to this Province. I am glad you are of Opinion that Ten Companies can be well accommodated here; I was much afraid they could not; but, indeed, tho' there is a great Scarcity of Inns in most of our Towns, there are Houses enough that will, upon Occasion, make very good Barracks.
