Extract of a Letter from our Correspondent at Fort
Herckheimer (commonly called Hackmer's) si-
tuated on our Frontiers, dated October 2, 1757.
"We indeed have continual Alarms, have one
even now whilst I am Writing, a Boy this Instant
bring at Five Indians: They are only a Scouting
Party, after whom we have ordered a Pursuit; and
hope a good Account. We have often been told
we should be attacked at such and such a Time,
but it has hitherto proved false.—We are always
alert, are now healthy, and full of Spirits, and
trust in God we shall always be able to give Ac-
count of ourselves, whenever called to it by pro-
fessed Friends, or real Enemies.

"As to what Mischiefs have been done since I
have been here, take as follows.—None but
Scalping Parties have appeared on the German
Flats: The greatest Number they consisted of, as
by the best Intelligence we have had, has not been
more than Thirty.—July 17, 1757, being Sun-
day, the first Scouting Party appeared, and attack-
ed on the North Side of the River, our Garrison
being on the South: They took Prisoners Nine,
and killed Three, one of them a Soldier belonging
to the Garrison.—August the 5th, on the North
Side they killed Two, and scalped them.—Au-
gust the 25th, on the same Side they killed One,
and scalped him; also wounded another, but did
not take him Prisoner.—September the 3d, they
killed and scalped One other, besides wounding
Two more, but took neither of the Two Prisoners.
Total taken, killed, and wounded, since the 24th
of May, 1757, Nineteen. I am, &c."

The Disaster of the English Squadron off Lou-
isburg the 25th of September last, is confirmed as
follows, viz. The Tilbury Man of War, and Fer-
rit Sloop, lost; the Nottingham lost her Mizen-
mast and Two Anchors, and had 7 Feet Water in
her Hold; the Invincible of 74 Guns, Grafton of
70, Nassau of 70, Prince Frederick of 70, De-
vonshire of 66, Sunderland of 60, Eagle of 60,
and Centurion of 50, all lost their Masts; as also
the Captain of 70 Guns, who was very nigh being
lost, having 10 Feet Water in her Hold, and the
Sea made a Breach over her for some Time; the
Nightingale of 20 Guns lost her Mizen and Main-
top-masts; the Bedford, Defiance, and Lightning
Fire-Ship, escaped; the Terrible of 74 Guns,
Northumberland of 70, Somerset of 70, Kingston
of 60, and Windsor of 60, are well. Several of
the Ships threw over their Guns, to the Amount
of about 100. Admiral Hardy hoisted his Flag
on board the Windsor, and with the Invincible,
Sunderland, Captain and Defiance, sailed for Eng-
land. After the Storm was over, the Admiral sent
the Lightning Fire-Ship to look into Louisburg;
but she was not returned when the last Accounts
came from Halifax, so that no Intelligence is yet
received of the Damage the French may have re-
ceived.

PHILADELPHIA, November 3.
Friday last Captain Stiles arrived here from An-
tigua, by whom there is Advice, that a great Num-
ber of Privateers were ready to sail from Martinico,
and waited only till they thought the Hurricanes
might be over. With him came Passenger Capt.
Sparks, late of the Brig Esther of this Port, who
was taken and carried into Guadaloupe. He ad-
vises, that the Privateers of that Place were also
getting ready for a Cruise; and that the French
had at Martinico, a Man of War of 60 Guns, one
of 50, one of 36, and one of 26 Guns.

ANNAPOLIS, November 10.
We are informed by Mr. Middleton, who came
up last Night from Virginia, that the Thomas and
Sarah, Capt. Holmes, from this Province, for Lan-
don, who sailed with the Convoy, having met with
very bad Weather, and received some Damage,
was returned thither, and it is thought will never
be able to go to Sea again; but the Cargo is not
much damaged.

The Baltimore-Town, Capt. Charles Ridgely, who
was thought to be lost, is safe arrived at Hampton.
