The Brig Duke of Marlborough Privateer, Da-  
vid Fenton, Commander, will, in a few Days, fall  
down to the Watering-Place, in order to proceed  
on a Cruize.

PHILADELPHIA, November 10.

The Sessions of the Assembly of the Counties of  
New-Castle, Kent and Suffex, on Delaware, end-  
ed on Saturday last; at which were passed, *An Act*  
*for granting Four Thousand Pounds to his Majesty's*  
*Use. An Act for establishing and regulating a Militia,*  
*to continue and be in Force during the present*  
*War. And, An Act for the better Quartering his*  
*Majesty's Forces.*

We have Advice from Shamokin, that on the  
25th of last Month Two Indian Squaws arrived  
there in a Canoe from Nescopokin, Joseph Nuti-  
mus's Wife and Daughter, and informed, that be-  
fore they left that Place, an Indian came in, who  
brought the following Intelligence, viz. That 600  
French had come to Diahogo, and were designed  
to the Northward; that 100 of them had set out  
for Cumberland County; that they had no Artil-  
lery with them; nor was it known what particular  
Scheme they were upon.

Capt. Cobourn, in 22 Days from Barbados, in  
Latitude 21, saw a French Fleet of 17 Sail, stand-  
ing to the Northward. By him there is Advice,  
that Commodore Moore is taking in Provisions for  
Three Months, and said to be going, with Five  
Sail of the Line, to Windward of Martinico.

From New-York we learn, that in Ulster Coun-  
ty, the latter Part of last Month, the Indians at-  
tempted thrice to surprize the Centries of Perry's  
Regiment, which is quartered there; and it was  
thought some of them were killed by these Cen-  
tries. It is also said, that the Inhabitants on the  
Frontiers of that Government are moving away  
very fast.

We hear from Northampton County, that on  
the 27th of last Month a Girl was carried off by  
the Indians from Hyndshaw's Fort: And that Tee-  
dyuscung had set off from thence for Wyoming,  
in order to meet the Commissioners lately gone  
there from this Government.

We have Advice from Charles-Town, in South-  
Carolina (via New-York) that a Bermudian Pri-  
vateer has carried in there a very valuable French  
Prize.

ANNAPOLIS, November 17.

Thursday last being the happy Anniversary of  
his Majesty's Birth, when his Majesty entered the  
Seventy-fifth Year of his Age, the same was ob-  
served here with much Loyalty and Joy; and in  
the Evening his Excellency our Governor gave a  
Ball, where was a very numerous and handsome  
Appearance of Ladies and Gentlemen.

Capt. George Nicholson is arrived in Patowmack,  
from Whitebaven, which he left the 10th of Sep-  
tember, and brings Advice, that the Fleet failed  
from St. Helen's the 9th on the Grand secret Expe-  
dition: There were 28 Ships of the Line, 12 Fri-  
gates, and 60 Transports, every Transport having  
Three Boats, which would Land Thirty Men each,  
so that they could (exclusive of the Men of War's  
Boats) at one Push Land 5400 Men.

The following Eight Persons were lately hang'd  
at Carlisle: Joseph Landouz, Matthew Candleman  
(Two Germans) William Augner (an American)  
and Bartholomew Collings (an Irishman) for De-  
serting with Design to join the French; William  
Hughes (a Welchman) Peter Councilman (a German)  
George Parker (an Englishman) and John M'Gea  
(an Irishman) all for Desertion. And on Tuesday  
last one John Price was carried from hence in Irons,  
in order to be executed for the same Crime.
