A MESSAGE from the GOVERNOR to the Assembly.

BEFORE I received your Message of the Twenty-fourth Instant, in Answer to mine of the Day before, I intended to have spoke to Indyslang, and to have taken my Leave of him in public; but, on his acquainting me, that the Messengers had heard of the Arrival of some Parties of Cherokee Warriors in Virginia, and were rreasy to be dispatched, that they might put the Indians who fent them on their Guard with respect m these Parties, I did not think it proper to detain them for a formal Conference, but gave them my Answer as soon as it could be got ready.

You will fee by the Minutes now laid before you, that I reminded Teedys/cung of the Prisoners remaining among the Indians; affuring him it would give great Satisfaction to me, the Council, Assembly, and all the People of the Province, to see as many of them brought have a sure a filter. many of them brought here as was possible. This I said in the Presence of the Messengers, and other Issians. To himself much more was said, intending it should likewise be faid in their Presence; but he advised me to the contrary, teiling me, that these Messengers would return instantly with agreeable Answers from the Indians, and till then no more need to be faid, and it would do more Harm than Good.

No Opportunity has offered, fince the Treaty at Easton, for my taking any Measures respecting the Kestoring of the Pritoners, more than reminding Teedyuseung of his Engagements on this Account, which I have not failed frequently to do, tho' not formally, as that would have answered no Purpole. The very first Opportunity that offers, with these or any other Indians, shall be very heartily embraced, and the Matter urged upon them with all the Zeal and Care in my Power.

Not knowing how far an Invitation to the Chiefs of these eight Tribes of Indians, who it seems live at great Distances from one another, might interiere with the Measures taken by his Majesty's Commander in Chief, or Sir William Johnson, the Superintendant of Indian Affairs in this District, I have not ventured to make it; but have transmitted to the General Copies of the Conferences, and of your Message, and mentioned the Advantages that would arise from such Invitation, desiring his Advice therein.

I have likewise dispatched a Messenger to Colonel Washington, or the commanding Officer of the Virginia Forces, at Winchester, with an Account of these Conferences, and the good Disposition of the Indians; and desired it might be forthwith communicated to the Cherokees, and they be requested to have Regard thereto in their future Excursions.
