L O N D O N, April 6.

WE hear that by the new Treaty just con-
 cluded with the King of Prussia, neither
 of the two Crowns is to make Peace without the
 Participation of the other.
 A large Ship from St. Domingo is brought into
 Plymouth by the Leostoffe Man of War.
 The Lottery Privateer of Guernsey, Captain

Cullum, is arrived at Falmouth, and has taken
 the Maria Theraize, Connet, of the Isle of Ray;
 the Cheval Martin, Orfonneau, of the Isle of Dieu;
 and St. Esprit, Bernard; and has likewise taken
 a Vessel laden with Wine, and a Snow of about
 200 Tons in Ballast.

April 8. To-morrow is to be launched, at
 Mr. Wells's Dock at Deptford, a new Ship of
 20 Guns, built for a Privateer, after a Model
 given by Admiral Knowles. There has never
 been any Ship constructed like her before.

On Thursday Morning Capt. Lockhart set out
 for Portsmouth, to take upon him the Command
 of the Chatham, a 50 Gun Ship.

The Leopard, from St. Maloes for Rochefort,
 in Ballast, in order to load Provisions for Canada,
 with 10 Guns and 20 Men, taken by the Lottery
 Privateer of Guernsey, of four Carriage Guns,
 and a few Swivels, William Cullum, Commander,
 with seven Prisoners on board, is brought into
 Penzance.

From on board a Dutch Ship, lately taken by
 the Vanguard and Isis Men of War, seven large
 Chests of Silver have been disembarked, and
 lodged in the Custom-House at Portsmouth.

The little County of Hohenstein, besides pay-
 ing to the French 200,000 Crowns, were forced
 to raise for them 500 Recruits; who, it was said,
 were to be employed in America.

Portsmouth, April 6. Wednesday the Neptune
 of 90 Guns, failed out of the Harbour of Spit-
 head, as did next Day the new Dorsetshire, of 74
 Guns, Captain Dennis, without her lower Deck
 Guns, which were sent after her in a Hoy, and
 directly got on board.

The Barfleur of 90 Guns, and several others of
 the Line, are almost ready to come out.

The Fleet at Spithead is to put to Sea directly,
 in Consequence of some News received by Ex-
 press. It is said the French Fleet is coming out
 of Brest.

April 7. On Wednesday in the Afternoon ar-
 rived an Express, with an Order to reinforce
 Admiral Hawke, there being a Report of the
 Brest Fleet being gone out, on which the follow-
 ing Ships will sail with all Expedition, viz. the
 Royal Sovereign, Royal George, Royal Anne,
 Neptune, Dorsetshire, and Dunkirk.

The Norfolk, Fougeux, and Deptford are to
 go from the Downs, and the Magnanime from
 Plymouth, all for the Bay.

The same Night three Hundred Soldiers were
 sent on board the Ships at Spithead: As also the
 Sloops of War and Merchantmen, except the
 Outward-bound Indiamen, were stripped of all
 their Men to man the above Ships.

Cork, April 10. Saturday arrived here the James
 and William, a Letter of Marque of Dublin, of
 14 Guns, and brought in with her the Maria
 Agnis of Amsterdam, Cornelius Coopman, Mas-
 ter, from St. Domingo and Leoganne in Hispanio-
 la, bound to Amsterdam, which she took on the
 3d Instant, in Lat. 50; she is 400 Tons Burthen,
 mounts 18 Guns, but made no Resistance; her
 Cargo consists of 18 Casks of Indico, 443 Casks
 of white and brown Sugar, 190 Casks and 23
 Sacks of Coffee, valued at 12,000l.

St. Jago De La Vega (in Jamaica) March 11.
 On Saturday last, 40 Minutes after Five in the
 Morning, a smart Shock of an Earthquake was
 felt in several Parts of this Island.

Kingston. Tuesday arrived here from Bristol
 and Cork, the St. James, Capt. James, mounting
 18 Six-pounders, and the Queen Elizabeth, Capt.
 Haney, mounting 14 Six, and 12 Four-pounders,
 both Letters of Marque, and carrying 80 Men
 each, and brought in with them the Spit-Fire Pri-
 vateer of 12 Guns, belonging to Bristol, who was
 taken by the Glanville Privateer, of Glanville,
 and retaken by them in Lat. 49, off the S. E.
 End of Hispaniola. They came up with a French

Frigate of 30 Guns, and exchanged Twelve
 Broad-sides with her, but Monsieur not liking
 his Reception, put before the Wind, and being
 a prime Sailer, soon got clear of them. This
 Frigate had a few Hours before taken the Snow
 Little Jenny, Capt. Nash, bound from Bristol to
 this Port. After parting with the Frigate, they
 took a Dutch Schooner, and in Sight of the
 Navassa, a large Dutch Ship, called the Cath-
 erina, with a French Supercargo on board, bound
 from Amsterdam to Porto-Prince, loaded with
 Wine, Brandy, &c. both which Vessels are safely
 arrived here.

March 18. Tuesday arrived Capt. Day in a
 Ship from Liverpool, but lost from New-York.
 In his Passage, off Martinico, he fell in with five
 French Privateers, three of whom engaged him at
 once, but after a smart Fire he got clear of them.
 Off the East End of this Island, he was attacked
 by a Privateer Sloop of 16 Guns, full of Men,
 who run his Jib-boom into Captain Day's Mizzen
 Shrouds, where it was immediately lashed, and as
 fast as the Frenchmen boarded the Ship, they were
 as vigorously repulsed, the Captain animating the
 Crew in a surprizing Manner, having killed ten of
 the Enemy with his own Hand, the Slaughter be-
 ing so great that the Deck run with Blood: How-
 ever Captain Day, finding there was no Likelihood
 of overpowering them, on Account of the Superi-
 ority of their Numbers, cut the Lashings, and his
 Mainfail filling, he soon got clear of them. The
 Engagement lasted near two Hours, and Captain
 Day had only one Man killed.

Port-Royal, March 12. Arrived his Majesty's
 Ship Wager, William Shurmer, Esq; Commander,
 and brought in a Dutch French Ship, loaded with
 Stores, Provisions, &c.

St. Jago de la Vega, March 25. On Tuesday,
 Morning, about Two o'Clock, a smart Shock of
 an Earthquake was felt in several Parts of the
 Island, which continued near a Quarter of a Mi-
 nute, but did no Damage.

Port-Royal, March 16. Arrived his Majesty's
 Ship Lively, with a Prize Brig from Rochelle,
 bound to Mississippi, laden with Bale Goods, &c.

22. Arrived a French Prize Brig, sent in by
 the Hornet Sloop.

St. Jago de la Vega, April 8. Two Dutch Ships,
 laden with Provisions for Hispaniola, were brought
 into Lucea on Sunday last by two Rhode-Island
 Privateers, one of 16 Guns, and her Consort, car-
 rying 10. They were attacked off the East End
 of the Island, a few Days ago, by a French Pri-
 vateer of 18 Guns, which after a short Engage-
 ment sheered off.

Extract of a Letter from Captain Robert Mantle,
 of the Privateer Sloop Thurlough, dated at Sea,
 April 1, 1758.

"After heaving down off the Island of Cuba,
 we turned to Windward the 30th ult. in the Morn-
 ing, and soon after saw a Sail, which proved to be
 a French Privateer of 4 Carriage and 8 Swivel
 Guns, but they being nearer the Land than we,
 the Frenchmen all got on Shore before we came
 up to her; after taking her, we joined the Port-
 Antonio Sloop, with whom we kept Company that
 Day, and the next Morning saw a Sail, which
 proved to be another French Privateer, whose
 People likewise quitted her before we came up."

Port-Royal, April 4. Arrived from a Cruise,
 his Majesty's Ship Sphynx, William Tucker, Esq;
 Commander, and brought in a French Prize Ship,
 bound from Martinico to Old France. His Maje-
 sty's Sloop Port-Antonio, Arthur Usher, Esq;
 Commander, also from a Cruise, and brought in
 a French Privateer Schooner of four Guns.

Kingston, April 19. Monday last a French Pri-
 vateer Sloop chased Capt. Donnell, in a Brig from
 Philadelphia, from Morant Bay, to within a Mile
 of the Palisadoes, where he engaged her for some
 Time; but Capt. Donnell's People in the Interim
