 Extra of a Letter from Commodore Holmes to Mr.
 Cleveland, dated from on board the Seaborse, at
 Anchor off Embden, March the 21st, 1758.

IT is with the greatest Pleasure that I can
 acquaint my Lords Commissioners of the
 Admiralty, of the Success of his Majesty's Ships
 in this River.

The Enemy had not suffered the Buoys to be
 laid this Year, thinking by that Means to obstruct
 any Attempts for the Recovery of Embden by Sea.
 It was therefore with equal Surprize and Concern,
 that they observed the Arrival of his Majesty's Ships
 Seahorse and Strombolo; and after having doubled
 the Number of their Workmen upon the Batteries
 they had begun, they set about raising three more
 towards the Sea with all Expedition; expecting to
 be attacked from that Quarter.

On the 17th the Seahorse and Strombolo an-
 chored between Delfziel and Knok, and on the
 18th they came to their Station between Knok and
 Embden, by which the Enemy saw themselves
 cut off from all Communication down the River.

They continued working on their Batteries
 towards the Sea; but at the same Time made all
 the necessary Preparations for evacuating the Place.

On the 19th, at six in the Morning, the
 French Troops were under Arms, and marched
 out of the Town before Night. And,

On the 20th, the Austrians began their March
 at Nine in the Morning.

About Noon, and not before, I had Intelli-
 gence of these Operations, and that they had been
 transporting their Baggage and Cannon up the
 River in small Vessels over Night; and that one
 of them was lying round a Point of Land at some
 Distance from us, to go up by next Tide.

So soon as we could stem the Tide, I dis-
 patched the armed Cutter Acrias, and two of my
 Boats, in Pursuit of the Enemy. They came up
 with the Vessel we had Intelligence of, and took
 her.

I reinforced them by another Boat, and the
 whole Detachment, commanded by Capt. Taylor,
 continued the Chace up the River. The Enemy
 at this Time lined both Sides of it, and gave
 the first Fire on the Boats; who were then coming
 up with three of their armed Vessels. The Fire
 was briskly returned on our Side; and, in Sight of
 their Army, and under their Fire, Capt. Taylor
 came up with one of them, attacked her, run her
 aground, and carried her, after some Firing on
 both Sides. The Officers and Men left the Vessel
 to recover the Shore, in attempting of which some
 of them were dropt by the Fire from the Boat.

The other two Vessels which had the Cannon
 on board, got clear under Favour of the Night,
 and Cover of their Army.

The first Vessel taken, had the Son of Lieut.
 Col. Schollheims, of Prince Charles of Lorraine's
 Regiment, and one Corporal and one Pioneer on
 board, with some Baggage belonging to his Fa-
 ther. There was some Money found, which,
 partly from the Specie, and partly from the Man-
 ner of its being made up, was concluded to be Pay
 for the Troops, and therefore detained, together
 with the Corporal and Pioneer, and all the little
 Implements of War they had with them. As
 for the Lieut. Colonel's Son, he is but a Boy, and
 not of an Age to be regarded as an Enemy; for
 which Reason I have sent him ashore to be return-
 ed to his Father, with all his and his Father's
 Things; and have wrote to his Father, that upon
 giving me his Honour that the Money is truly his
 private Property, it shall be returned.

The other Vessel that was taken, had on board
 Major de Bertrand, M. Von Longen, Commissary
 of War; M. Trajane, Adjutant de la Place; M.
 Le Bouffe, Lieut. of Artillery, and a Guard of
 private Men, with three Hostages which they had
 carried off from Embden, viz. Eado Wilhelm Zur
 Michlen, Doctor of Laws, President of the Col-
 lege de Quarantes, and Administrator of the Royal
 and Provincial College at Aurich; Baron Von
 Hane of Leer, Administrator at Embden; and
 Haiko Geo. Eden, Administrator of Leer.

M. Eado Wilhelm Zur Michlen received a Shot
 in the Vessel during the Scuffle, but it is not dan-
 gerous: From him I had the Account I have al-
 ready given to their Lordships of the happy Effect
 the Presence of his Majesty's two Ships have pro-
 duced, by occasioning the sudden Evacuation of
 the Enemy out of the Town of Embden.

By a private Letter to a Gentleman here we are
 told, that several of the Prussian Officers being
 corrupted by the Enemy, had entered into a Con-
 spiracy to deliver the King of Prussia, dead or
 alive, into the Hands of the Austrians; which his
 Majesty having discovered, caused the Generals
 Kiouw and Katt to be stripped of their Regi-
 mental, and then shot. Twenty-one other Offi-
 cers, and above 80 Subalterns, who were like-
 wise concerned therein, were ordered to be hang-
 ed; but on their representing the Ignominy of
 their Death, he ordered that they should be ho-
 noured with an higher Gallows than usual, and
 that an Abbe (who pretended to be forced from
 Paris lately) the Partner of their Crime, should be
 hanged underneath them. Two other Generals
 (one of whom was a Favourite of the King's) is

said to have been drawn to Pieces by four Horses,
 on the same Account; and several Saxons who
 had been made Prisoners, but on their Parole
 suffered to go at Liberty, having since engaged
 among the French and Austrian Troops, have been
 retaken and hanged.

Plymouth, April 14. Since my last arrived the

London, April 18. By Letters from Embden we
 hear, that of the Garrison of French and Imperial-
 ists, consisting of near 4000 Men, which quitted
 that Place on the Approach of our Men of War,
 as lately appeared in the London Gazette, not
 above 500 joined the French Army, the rest being
 either killed, taken Prisoners, or dispersed.

They write from Hull of the 12th, that a
 Fishing Boat had brought an Account, that one
 of our 20 Gun Ships had taken a French Privateer
 of 16 Guns off Scarborough, and that when
 he passed them, they were steering to the South-
 ward.

April 25. It is said the Dutch Stocks have

April 29. Yesterday the Orders were counter-
 manded that were formerly given out, for the
 three Battalions of Foot Guards to march to Camp
 on the 15th, 16th, and 17th of next Month.
 They are now to march on Tuesday the 9th of
 May for Portsmouth, are to compleat their march
 in three Days, and to encamp every Night during
 their march, it having been found, on such Oc-
 casions, very inconvenient to put Soldiers into
 Quarters on a March. Transports are getting
 ready at Portsmouth to carry them immediately
 over to the Isle of Wight. The Duke of Marl-
 borough is to have the chief Command, and Gen-
 eral Drury commands under his Grace.
