" The fame Day came in here Lieut. Holmes of the Rangers; from a Scout to Ticonderoga with mbout Men's who informs, that he lay very near the Fort, and fays, that there is a very large En-campment there, and that the Enemy have erected fome Block-Houses at their Breast-Work. Many Indians are there. .
