Extrad of a Latter from the Oneida Carrying Place,
OHober 13, 1758.

The Grand Sachem of the Oneida Indians was with us at the taking of Frontenac; he was one of the most Christian Indians I ever faw. in my Life, conflantly at Prayer, talking of Heaven and a future State, and faid, if we go on praying, the Land would be ours, and he would help us all that he could. Friday laft he took his Leave of us, and faid, if he heard of any Thing he would let us know it: At One o'Clock, he, with three others, bid us farewell, but before he got half a Mile from our Encampment, he was that dead, one taken, and the other two got in: The Captains alarmed went out, and found the poor King scalped, and brought him into the Fort, but could not come up with the Enemy: The General ordered a Coffin to be made for him, and gave his Wife white Linen to lay him out in; and on Saturday in the Afternoon he was decently buried in the North West Bastion, three Cannon fired over him, and the Indians performed their Ceremonies by drinking of Wine; the Oneidas are determined to have Satisfaction for fo great a Loss: The same Asternoon an Indian who belonged to Major Ingerfol, and who was taken at Lake-George, 1757, came in, having made his Escape from the Party that killed the King; he says, he was carried to Canada, and has lived with the Indians ever fince; that the Party confifted of 100, and only 5 Frenchmen: That they could have killed several white Men, but did not want to do

it, as they had got the Person they wanted."-NEW-YORK, Odober 30. Yesterday arrived here a large French Prize Ship, taken by Capt. Valantine, in a Privateer Snow of this Place: She was bound from Canada to the West Indies; and 'baded but indifferently. Ine same Day came in the French Prize Ship of Capt.
