Liverpool, Sept. 22. The Lords of the Admiralty have stationed a 50 Gun Ship to cruise in the North Channel between Ireland and Scotland, in order to protect the Trade of these Parts from the Insults of French Privateers.

Extract of a Letter from Kinsale, dated the 10th ult. This Day arrived by Majesty's Ship, Scarborough of 36 Guns, James Gilebrish, Esq. Commander, and has brought in the Countess Privateer of Dunkirk, of 16 Six-pounders, 18 Small Guns, and 77 Men, Juan Baptista de Coque, late Commander, who is a new Ship of 285 Tons Burthen, came out about six Weeks since, and about 14 Days at Sea, in which Time she had taken a Vessel from Carolina, and had the Raisin on board. She was on the 24th sixty Leagues West of Cape Clear, after the Loss of ten Men killed and several wounded.

A Letter from Count Dohna's Army imports, that the Russians, being deprived of Money and Provisions, committed the most unheard-of Acts of Cruelty and Violence in their Retreat; which had so enraged the Troops sent in Pursuit of them, that it was impossible to restrain them from cutting to Pieces almost all they came up with; and that upon summing up the Accounts received from the different Parties to the 4th of September, it appeared that they had killed about 7000 Men in the Pursuit, and taken 19 Pieces of Cannon, with about 3000 Prisoners.

Some Letters from Germany advise, that there appears a very great Desertion from the Austrian Army under Count Daun, and in particular from the Duke of Wirtembourg's Troops, who desert in Companies, as it is assur'd, not only for Want of Provisions, but Pay.

By a Letter from Dantzick last Mail, there is an Account that a Body of 4 or 5000 Russians, Part of General Fermer's Army, arrived the 9th Inst. at Langsuthre, about a German Mile from that Place; they were in a bad Condition, but had some Baggage and Cannon with them; it was thought they were destined for the Kingdom of Prussia. It's added, that the Gates of that City were kept shut till they had passed.

PORTSMOUTH, in NEW-HAMPSHIRE, Nov. 23. Last Wednesday arrived here Captain Moulton from Cape-Breton, which Place he left last Saturday was Sev'nnight, and brings the following important Intelligence, which was brought to Louisburg by the Sutherland Man of War, Capt. Rous, from Newfoundland, and which may be depended on, viz. That twenty Transports having Soldiers on board, under Convoy of a 60 Gun Ship, bound from France to Canada, as they were going thro' the Streights of Belleisle, the Man of War, with nineteen of the Transports, were entirely lost in a violent Gale of Wind, and every Man on board perished.

The Kennington Frigate, with every Man on board was lost in the same Gale, besides a Number of other English Vessels in Spanish Harbour.

BOSTON, November 27. Thursday arrived here Capt. Archer from Newfoundland, in whom came a Seafaring Man, who informs, that he sailed from Bristol in Capt. Beach for this Place about the 26th of June last; and six Days after was taken by a French Man of War of 64 Guns, called the Eagle, bound to Canada: That they took out a few Bales of Goods, and then burnt Beach's Vessel: That in the Streights of Belleisle the 64 Gun Ship was cast away the 6th of August, but the People all saved, except twelve Frenchmen who were sick on board; the Ship beat to Pieces in two Hours: The whole Crew were upon an Island, but expected to be taken soon off, as Vessels were expected from Canada every Day for that Purpose. He adds, that he and 7 more, about the 10th of September in the Night, got on board a small Lighter and ran away; and were 20 Days before they arrived at Newfoundland. Capt. Beach, and all his Men, 45 in Number, were well when this Man got away.

Notwithstanding what is mentioned under the Portsmouth Head of the Loss of the Kennington Frigate with all her Men, in Spanish Harbour, we are informed by a Gentleman who left Halifax Yesterday Fortnight, that the Ship was then safe at Halifax. We apprehend that the Account of the 19 Transports wants Confirmation, as the Sailor who came Passenger in Capt. Archer, and who was on board the Man of War when she was lost, says there was no Vessel in Company but a Frigate, that got clear.

NEW-YORK, December 4. A Pennsylvania Frigate, Captain Sibbald, on Thursday last was spoke with off the Wood-Lands, some few Leagues South West of Sandy Hook, still in Quest of Monsieur Chateleau, who seems to

be playing Bow-peep with our Cruizers, as, on the Thursday before, the Privateer Sturdy Beggar, Capt. Troop, was spoke with 45 Leagues to the Eastward of Cape Henlopen (all well) and also on the hunting Order for the Prince Edward.

All the Men of War and Transports, who sailed from Louisburg with the Garrison and Inhabitants of that Place, and its Dependencies, are all safe arrived at Portsmouth and Plymouth, in Old England. The Governor and his Lady, with several French Ladies and Officers, were immediately upon their Arrival sent off for North-Hampton, that Place being appointed for their Residence. The Admirals Boscawen and Hardy, were not got Home when our Advices came away.

On the 22d of October, a violent Hurricane happened at Louisburg, which forced on Shore 12 Sail of Merchantsmen, and in all Probability they will not be got off. There were then in the Harbour, ten Sail of the Line, and one Frigate. The Admiral intended to sail in a few Days with nine Sail, in order to winter at Halifax.

Monsieur Chateleau, in a Letter to his Owners, which was found on board the Snow lately retaken from him by the Sturdy Beggar, and sent in here, says, after acquainting them with the Particulars of his successful Cruize, That he had sacrificed his Honour to their Interest, three different Times, by not engaging the Pennsylvania Guarda Costa, she having been thrice in his View; but had he 300 Men on board, he would lie in the River Delaware, and pick his Prizes.

Brigadier-General WHITMORE, Governor and Commander in Chief of the Island of Cape-Breton, informs the several Provinces on the Continent, That there will be no Contract proposed or made in Regard to the supplying of Louisburg with Provisions this Winter; but that there will be a free Market for all Sorts of fresh Provisions.

ANNAPOLIS, December 14.

It is with great Pleasure we inform the Public, That Yesterday in the Afternoon Lieutenant Colonel DAGWORTHY arrived here from the OHIO, with the agreeable News, That his Excellency General FORBES took Possession of FORT DUQUESNE the 25th of last Month, the Enemy having abandoned it Two Days before. A Virginia Lad who had been a Prisoner with them, and made his Escape just as they were going off, confirms the Account (that was given by Johnson, and the Two Indians, who were taken Prisoners), which was inserted in our last Gazette; and likewise gives this farther Account: That when Monsieur Delignere, the Commandant of Fort Duquesne, was informed that the English Troops were within about 20 Miles of it, he ordered the Artillery, and all the Stores, to be put on board a Number of Battoes, and sent off Half the Garrison (which consisted of about 500 Men) with them down the River; all the Houses both within and on the outside of the Fort, and in the Horn Work, were then set on Fire; and the Rest of the French went up the River towards Venango. Every Thing that could be burnt, was destroyed; and some Parts of the Fort and Out-works were blown up and demolished: It is said, however, that the General intends to repair the Fort, and to leave a Garrison there during the Winter. The Day after General Forbes took Possession of the Fort, Four of the Ohio Indians came to him with a Message from their respective Towns; and the next Day Mr. Croghan, and Montour the Indian Interpreter, were sent off with an Answer, which, it was supposed, was to invite all the Ohio Indians to a Treaty; and it was supposed, that they would readily accept the Invitation.
