LONDON, MAY 9.

WHEN HEAR that 200,000 l. will be granted for the Purpose mentioned in the following Message sent on Thursday by his Majesty to Parliament:

GEORGE R.
HIS Majesty, being sensible of the Zeal and Vigour with which his faithful Subjects in NORTH-AMERICA have exerted themselves in Defence of his Majesty's just Rights and Possessions, recommends it to his Majesty's Honourable Council, to take into Consideration, and to enable his Majesty to give them a proper Compensation for the Expences incurred by the respective Provinces in the Levying, Cloathing, and Pay of the Troops raised by the same, according as the said Zeal and Vigour and Efforts of the respective Provinces shall justly appear to merit.

The 20,000 l. for the Support of our Settlements in the East-Indies was granted in Consequence of the following Message:

GEORGE R.
HIS Majesty being desirous that a proper Strength may be employed in the Settlements of the united Company of Merchants of England, trading to the East-Indies, recommends to this House, to enable his Majesty to assist the said Company in defraying the Expences of a military Force in the East-Indies, to be maintained by them in Lieu of the Battalion commanded by Colonel Alderson, withdrawn from thence, and now returned to Ireland.

Extract of a Letter from a Gentleman at New-Castle, to his Friend at York, April 29.

Yesterday an Express arrived for all the Estates who know the Holland Coast, to go directly to London. This which causes much Speculation, may be depended on for Fact.

In destroying the Austrian Magazine at Budin, in Bohemia, the Wind drove the Flames into the Town, and entirely reduced it to Ashes, to the great Grief of Prince Henry, who endeavoured all in his Power to extinguish it.

The following Circumstance is told of the Death of the Prince of Humberg. Just as he was going to lead his Grenadiers to the Assault of the Enemy's Trenches, he said with great Composure, COME MY FRIENDS, WHOEVER HAS COURAGE, LET HIM FOLLOW ME. Scarcely had he pronounced these Words, when he received a Mallet-Ball in his Breast, and expired immediately. Twelve Men carried off his Body in a Chaise to be buried in the Tomb of his Ancestors.

We hear that the Right Honourable the Earl of Becho-rough, one of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, and the Hon. Robert Trevor Hampden, Esq; formerly Minister Resident at the Hague, are appointed joint Post-masters-general of Great-Britain, in the room of the Earl of Leicester, and Sir Everard Faulkner.

The Right Honourable Secretary PITT, who has been for some Time indisposed with the Gout, is so well recovered as to be able to do Business as usual.

Yesterday at night an Express arrived at Pensance from the Land's End, with Advice that a Vessel was taken that Morning by a French Privateer Brig within Sight of the Shore. The Diligence Sloop of War, being then in Gwa-ryas Lake, weighed Anchor immediately and put to Sea, and on Tuesday Morning returned with the Privateer. She is called the Dispatch, belongs to Morlaix, mounts 10 Guns, and had about 30 Hands on board when she was taken. She had made five Captures, and sent them to France.

The St. Anthony de Padua, Vice-Commodore, from London, is arrived at Gibraltar. In her Passage, in the Channel, she was boarded by two English Privateers, one of which took out two Sacks of Flour and one Basket of Cheese; and when the Captain asked for Payment, the Privateer's Men beat him severely. Well may the Neutral Powers ward their Policies of Insurance in the following Manner: "Free of Captures and Seizures from Turks, Moors, English, and other Barbarians."

The Madona del Carmello, from London to Venice, Braile, Master, is taken and carried into Algiers. The above Ship fought a considerable Time with two of the Algerine Cruisers, and beat them off; but two more coming down to their Assistance, she was obliged to strike, after an Engagement of two Hours, in which she had sixty Men killed, besides the first and second Captains, who were Brothers.

We are assured, that the Privateers of Guernsey and Jersey have been so successful during the present War, altho' small Ships, as to clear above 200,000 l. exclusive of all Charges. It is said the Salaries of all great Places that become vacant will be applied to the Exigencies of State.

We are informed that an Officer, who was lately in his Majesty's Service, and died in his Passage home from the East-Indies, has left the Bulk of his Fortunes, which amounts to upwards of 30,000 l. to a Relation, who is now a Journeyman Printer.

THE following is a Translation of the SPEECH made to the KING by the Dutch-Deputies, on delivering their Credentials.

"We have the Honour, Sirs, to present to your Majesty our Letter of Credence, from their High Mightinesses the States-General of the United Provinces, our Lords and Masters. Your Majesty will see, by it's Contents, how ardently their High Mightinesses desired to cultivate the sincere Friendship which hath so long subsisted between the two Nations, and which is so necessary to their common Welfare. May we be but happy enough, pursuant

to our Masters Commands, to remove those Difficulties which have for some Time past diminished this Friendship, and caused so much Prejudice to the principal Subjects of the Republic, who, by the Trade they carry on, are it's greatest Strength and chief Support."

"We place our whole Confidence in your Majesty's Equity, for which the Republic hath always expressed its Gratitude. In the Good-Will your Majesty hath always expressed towards a State, which on all Occasions hath interested itself in promoting your Glory, and which is the Guardian of the precious Trust left by a Prince so dear to your Majesty."

"Full of this Confidence, we presume to flatter ourselves, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to listen to our just Demands; and we shall endeavour, during the Course of our Ministry, to merit your Approbation, and to strengthen the Bonds which ought to unite the two Nations for ever."

HIS MAJESTY'S ANSWER.
GENTLEMEN,

"I have always had a Regard for the Republic, and I look upon their High Mightinesses as my best Friends. If Difficulties have arisen touching Trade, they ought to be considered as the Consequences of a just War, and are obliged to cease with Peace. You may assure their High Mightinesses, that I shall endeavour on my Part, to remove the Obstacles which may have arisen in this Disposition."

ST. JOHN'S (in ANTIGUA) May 26.
The Master of a Vessel lately arrived from New-England, took up at Sea, in Lat. 39, and Long. 69, a Quantity of Teat-Pole, Mallets, &c. and saw a large Quantity of other warlike Stores, and a Ballisprit (which seemed to have been cut away) floating in the Sea, marked [4th Regiment]; which Regiment is now at Louiburg. Hence it is feared, some of the Transports which sailed with Admiral Holmes has met with some Disaster.

Captain Higgins, of the Brig Hawke, a Flag of Truce from Martinico, arrived here this Morning, with about 40 Masters of Vessels; by whom we have a Confirmation of those Accounts, which, with uncommon Reliance, we have before been obliged to mention, viz. That English Prizes have been, and still are, daily carried into Martinico. The general Account of the Number of Prizes lately carried in, is such as must move every one who feels for his Country; might we not hope, that when the List appears, this Account will be greatly curtailed. The Prisoners bring an Account, and it is generally believed, that M. Bompas, fallen from Martinico the Beginning of this Month.

June 16. This Day arrived here a large Dutch Sugar-loaded Sloop, of 12 Guns, taken on her Passage from Martinico to St. Eustatia, by his Majesty's Ship Captain Taylor, who was left in Pursuit of two others which were
