Perfuade yourselves that he will tread in the Steps of his glorious Ancestors, that the Mildness of his Government will be diffused on all his Subjects. I cannot but feel the highest Pleasure at your approving of my Conduct. You may rely on me, whenever it will be in my Power, to promote your Harpiness, and if there be an Opportunity, I will omit nothing that may contribute to you a flourishing and happy People.

Captain Parker, for this Place, from Lifbon, likewise got in there, after being 12 Weeks at Sea, and failed again with Captain Burrows for this Port.

From South-Carolina we learn, that confiderable Magazines were forming, and every necessary Measure taken, for forwarding and facilitating the Expedition against the Cherokees: That the Creeks were fill much divided among themselves as to joining in the War with them: And that Major Thomson, and Captain M'Intosh, had set out from Ninety-Six for Fort Prince George, with 555 Rangers, cicorting some Cattle and Hogs, a large Number of Waggons with Provisions for the Garrison there, and some Goods, to be laid out in redeeming the unfortunate Prisoners that are in the Hands of the Indians.
