N E W - P O R T , *March 24.*
On Sunday last arrived here Thomas Baxter in the Schooner King David, in 23 Days from Monto Christo. On the 23d of February, she was taken on her Passage from Cape François to Coraco, by the Diana, a Privateer Brig of this Port, commanded by Samuel Sweet. Her Cargo consists entirely of Coffee. Capt. Baxter informs us that the Captains Rodman, Wheatley, and Chapman, from this Place, lately arrived at the Mount.

N E W - Y O R K , *March 25.*
Extract of two Letters from an eminent Merchant in London dated the 10th and 16th of December last.

"I deferred answering your Letters until this Day, that I might know the Event of a Trial in Doctors Commons, relating to an English Ship, who was taken after coming out of Monto Christo Harbour by a Man of War. She had taken in her lading from Spanish Barques, and had colourable Papers on board. The Judge of the Admiralty released the Ship and Cargo without Costs, because she had colourable Papers on board. Consequently, had she no such Papers on board, he would have condemned the Captain in Costs. This I think is out of Dispute.

"By colourable Papers, I mean any Papers but what are true and genuine, such as False Clearances, Bills of Lading, Invoices or Charter Parties; a Ship from Monto Christo may produce Clearances from Jamaica or any other English Port, or in order to avoid the Risque of the French, may produce Clearances and Papers as a Danish, Dutch, or Spanish Ship. The Ship I mentioned, was taken near this Coast, by a Man of War and brought in here, and had some such Papers on board, which intitled the Man of War to bring her in; but as the Property was proved to be bought from the Spaniards on English Account, she was released and the Captors were not obliged to pay Costs, because she had some Papers on board to secure her from English Men of War, as if she had come from Jamaica, or from the Enemy, as being a neutral Ship and going to a neutral Port."

Extract of a Letter from Rhode Island, dated March 23d, 1761, to the Owners of the Letter of Marque Ship Duke of Cumberland, of this Port, Captain Cregier.

"With infinite Satisfaction I lay hold of this first Opportunity of congratulating you on the Duke of Cumberland's good Success, having this Moment learned from a Prize Master who brought in this Day a Dutch Schooner, in 20 Days from the Mount, That the Duke of Cumberland remained at the Mount, and in Company of a Man of War had taken and sent into Jamaica, a Ship loaded with rich Goods coming from France, and bound in to the Cape, under Swedes, or Danes Colours, worth Sixty Thousand Pounds Sterling, and will be a good Prize: You may depend on this Intelligence."

A N N A P O L I S , *April 9.*
Thursday last an OX was Kill'd by Mr. Andrew Stiger, at Baltimore-Town, which, when whole, weigh'd 1870 Pounds. He was brought young from Conococheague by Mr. Stiger, and fed till he was Nine Years old. His Gut Fat weigh'd 173 Pounds, his Kidney Fat 82, his Hide, which was thin, weigh'd 106. He was 15 Hands and 3 Inches high.

The same Day Mr. Stiger Kill'd a CALF, but 9 Weeks old, which weigh'd 40 Pounds a Quarter.

A few Days ago as Five Men were crossing *Sufquebanna* in a Canoe, by some imprudent Management she overset, and Four of them were Drowned; the other got upon the Canoe, and saved his Life.
