That you may be more fully apprized what Af-fiftance His Majerly requires of you in particular, and how he vouchtafes to invite you by Promifes and Encouragements to do what your Duty to Him, and a Regard for your own Happiness and that of your Pollerity, must strongly prompt you to perform, I shall lay before you a Letter from the Right Honourable WILLIAM PITT, Eig; and another from his Excellency General AMHERET, hoping you will be thereby induced to purfue, at this Time, such Measures, as that they may both have the Satisfaction to Report to Our moit Gracious Sovereign, how chearfully you shall have complied with His Majesty's Requisition.
