

We have further Accounts, that Guderberg had surrendered to the Marquis of Granby. And, by Advices just received from General Sporcken, dated the 15th Instant, at Thomas-spruck, upon the Unstrut, between Mulhausen and Effenach, we likewise learn, that he, in Conjunction with the Prussians, had attacked the Saxons in those Parts, and that, besides cutting great Numbers of them to Pieces, he had taken five Saxon Battalions Prisoners of War.

March 3. All the Artillery and Baggage of the five Saxon Battalions, made Prisoners by General Sporcken, likewise fell into his Hands.

March 6. The Empress Queen of Hungary has disposed of the Regiment of Foot that was vacant by the Death of Count Henry Joseph Daun, lately deceased; in Favour of Lieutenant-General O'Kelly, an Irish Gentleman.

In Consequence of the Quadruple Alliance, said to be lately concluded, a Squadron of Men of War, consisting of 16 Sail, will speedily be ordered to the Mediterranean.

All the Armed Men of War and Transports, are ordered to rendezvous next Week.

The Officers that are to go on the intended Expedition, it is said, are to take Leave of his Majesty next Week, and then proceed to Portsmouth directly, where every Thing is preparing with the greatest Diligence.

The Expedition Fleet are ordered to take in eight Months Wine, and Provisions of all Sorts.—The following is a List of the Ships that compose it, viz. Valiant, Commodore Kappel, of 74 Guns; Sandwich 90, Torbay 74, Modeste 74, Superbe 74, Temeraire 74, Dragon 64, Swiftsure 70, Hampton-court 70, Essex 64, Achilles 60, Prince of Orange 60, Laurenceston 40, and Lynn of 40 Guns. Frigates and Fireships. Southampton, Alderney, Infernal, Vesuvius, Aetna, Furnal, Firedrake, Laurel, and Garland.

At Spithead, Admiral Geary, with 31 Sail of Men of War.

Last Tuesday the Swallow Sloop of War arrived at Plymouth from a Cruise, and brought in a Snow Privateer, belonging to Bayonne, called the Sultan, of 12 Guns, and 70 Men.

Last Monday the Anna Maria, of and for London, from Virginia, arrived at Plymouth. She was taken by the French, and retaken by the Melampe Frigate.

We hear that Orders are issued from the Admiralty, that a proper Force be stationed to guard the North Seas from the Enemy's Privateers, to cruise from the Highland Isles, to at least 100 Leagues West of Tory, to continue from the Opening of Spring to the Approach of Winter.

The Parnassus, Gilman, from Africa to America, was taken by two French East-Indiamen, homeward bound, and sent for Martinico.

Eight Ships are taken up by the Government, at Portsmouth, to go to Fyall, to take in Wines there for the Use of the Expedition Fleet, bound to the West-Indies.

Monuments are going to be erected in Westminster-Abbey for the late Lord Howe, General Wolfe, and Admiral Vernon.

We hear that the 17th Day of March is fix'd for the dissolving the present Parliament.

Extract of a private Letter from Dublin, Feb. 3. On Tuesday last an Hon. Gentleman eloped with an Actress belonging to Crow-Street Theatre: Diligent Search was made after him, but to no Effect, as they went in a Wherry to the Isle of Men. Several Missengers were sent after them.

The young Gentlemen belonging to the College, who murdered the Man at Temple-Bar a few Days ago, are to be tried the 16th Instant. Thirty Thousand Pounds Bail was offered for them, but refused.

Admiralty-Office, Feb. 18. Capt. Johnstone, of his Majesty's Sloop the Hornet, gives an Account, by Letter dated at Lisbon the 29th of January, That he had taken and carried into that Port, a French Privateer, called the Society of St. Maloes, of 6 Guns and 60 Men.

Kinsale, January 27. Arrived the Volunteer of Whitby, Burthen 400 Tons, with Tobacco from Maryland, bound to London; she was taken by a French Privateer, and retaken by one of his Majesty's Ships of War.

Glasgow, Feb. 5. The Polly of Glasgow, Capt. Gemmel, bound to Virginia, on the 14th of November last, in Lat. 39. 10, and Long. 41. 38 W. was taken by the Bourbon Privateer of 18 Guns six Pounders, with 200 Men, commanded by Capt. Pierre Maiguille, who after taking out Part of the Cargo, ran her for 1100 l. The Privateer had cruised between the Latitudes of 39 and 42, about a Month, and had taken four Ships bound from Virginia for London, and gave out that she was to continue on that Station six Weeks longer. The Polly's Ransomers are now at Bayonne.

Edinburgh, Feb. 18. We are inform'd that the following noble Lords are Candidates to represent the Peerage of Scotland, next Election, Duke of Argyll, Marquis of Tweeddale, Earls of Rothes, Morton, Eglington, Murray, Home, Abercorn, Loudoun, Breadalbine, Dunmore, March, Marchmont, Bute, Viscount of Stormont, and Lord Cathcart.

Lately died George Forbes, Farmer, in the Parish of Maryculter, Aberdeen, in the 106th Year of his Age.

PHILADELPHIA, April 30.

From the English Papers we find the following French Vessels of War taken by his Majesty's Ships, viz. The Warwick, of 14 Guns, but pierced for 60, the same as when she belonged to his late Majesty, taken by Captain Hood, after a desperate Engagement; who also took a Bayonne Privateer of 14 Guns.

The Felicie, a French Frigate, of 32 Guns, destroyed by the Richmond Frigate, Captain Eipbinstone, after an obstinate Action as it is supposed to have happened this War.—Two Privateers belonging to Dunkirk, one of 18, the other of 8 Guns, taken by the Soloboy, Amazon and Vengeance Men of War.—The Dutchess of Gramont Privateer, of St. Maloes, of 12 Guns (formerly his Majesty's Sloop Hawk) taken by the Juno Man of War.—A Privateer, of 18 Guns, taken by the Quebec.—The Mexarine Privateer, of 12 Guns, taken by the Niger.—A Bayonne Privateer, of 12 Guns, taken by the Stag.—And the Count de Gramont, of Bayonne, of 20 Guns; another of 10; and a third, of smaller Force; all taken by the Aquillon.

Captain Montgomery, from Maryland to London, is taken, and sent to Vigo; and the Tiger, from Bristol to Virginia, Conky, is also taken, and sent to the same Place. Captain Craig, from Virginia to Glasgow, is taken and carried into Bayonne; as is Captain Reid, from London to Virginia.

His Majesty's Ships Falkland, Sutherland, Repulse, Fowey, and Lizard, are arrived at New-York from Halifax.

The Troop (about 2000 Men) it is said, were to sail from New-York on Wednesday last, but were detained, was not known.

Yesterday the Fanny, Captain Lane, arrived here from London, which she left the 13th of March, and Spithead the Eleventh; when the Expedition Fleet was not sailed.

The Ship Friendship, Captain Falconer, from this Port for London, is taken and carried to Bayonne.

Captain Basset, from Antigua, on his Passage took a French Schooner from the Mississippi to Martinico, laden with Pitch, Tar, &c. and sent her to Bermuda.

ANNAPOLIS, May 7.

Friday last came to Town, from London, Capt. Robert Bryce, of this Place, who came Passenger in a Ship to Philadelphia. He informs us, that the Mary, Capt. Day, from this Province, was safe arrived in London; but that the Buchanan, Capt. Slator, from hence, was taken and carried into Bayonne.

Capt. Bryce likewise informs us, that the Fleet for Maryland and Virginia was to sail about the 17th of April, under Convoy of a 50 and a 20 Gun Ship.
