

passed the Unstrut at the same Place, and cantoned at Muhlhausen, where still 53 of the Enemy's Sick were found, and made Prisoners of War.

On the 17th Major-General Luckner, with his Corps, composed the Van-guard, and marched to Eisenach, which he attacked, and forced the Enemy, who was still there, under the Command of the Generals Stainville and Solms, to retire to Vacha. About forty Prisoners were taken there, and two Saxon Officers. The Army made a forced March in two Columns, and cantoned in the Neighbourhood of Streck; and Neukirchen. Luckner's Corps remained at Eisenach.

On the 18th they halted. This Day came in above 300 Swifs and Saxon Deserters.

On the 19th, Luckner's Corps, reinforced with four Squadrons of Veltheim's and Bremer, marched as far as Vacha (the Bridge of which was barricaded) attacked and forced the Enemy to abandon it about Midnight. Six of our Men were killed, and about thirty of the Enemy's wounded. General Luckner lodged the Light Troops in Vacha, and cantoned the rest of his Corps on the Right of the Werra near Vacha. The first Line marched to Ober Elin, and Forda, and the second to Eisenach.

On the 20th Luckner's Corps halted. The first Line of Sporcken's Corps marched to Heringen and Kieselbach and the second to Vehren Brietenbach and Frauensee. The Prussian Troops marched this Day to Gotha, to observe the Army of the Circles, which was re-assembled at Arnstedt.

On the 21st Luckner's Corps marched to Mansbach, and passed the Werra at Vacha. The first Line marched to Freidenwald, Hamelshausen, and Lengers, passing the Werra at Vacha and Lengers. The second marched to Heringen and Vacha. Many Deserters came in from Stainville's Corps, which made its Retreat by Mansbach to Fulda.

LONDON, January 31.

His Prussian Majesty's Affairs are at present in excellent Order; his Army is very numerous; his Magazines properly disposed, and well replenished. He has fought Peace while he was preparing for War; and the Public will receive the most authentic Proofs of the Veracity of these Assertions from his early Operations, which may possibly decide the Fate of the Campaign almost as soon as it is begun.

Some Letters from Paris say, that they are fitting out both at Rochfort and Brest all the Ships of War and Frigates that are fit to go to Sea.

These Letters add, that it had been computed that the Number of French Ships taken by the English last Year amounted to 944; and the Number of English Ships taken by them, to 239.

The Prince Frederick, Robinson, from Maryland for London, is taken and carried into St. Maloes.

The Triton, Hardy, from Maryland to London, is taken and carried into Bayonne.

The Duke, ———, and the Hicks, Smith, both from Maryland, are arrived at Whitehaven.

The Nancy and Molly, Kingsbay, from Maryland to London, is taken and carried into St. Maloes.

Extract of a Letter from Paris, January 23.

The Ships that lately got out of the Villaine, are happily arrived at Brest.

The Courageux, of 74 Guns, is sailed from that Port with several Frigates, having on board 500 Royal Grenadiers; but we know not the Destination of this small Squadron.

February 3. His Majesty's Ship the Loo, commanded by Captain Penny, in a late Cruise to the Westward, retook, on the 23d of November, the Ruby Brigantine, of Whitby, from Maryland bound to London, which had been taken the Day before by a Bayonne Privateer.

February 14. We may form a Judgment of the immense Trade the Dutch have acquired during the present War, from the following List of the Fleet which sailed from the Texel the 26th ult. which consisted of 72 Sail for France, 20 for Lisbon, 22 for Cadix, 30 for the Straights, 10 for England, 8 for Corocoa, 17 for Eustatia, 17 for Surinam, and 10 for East-India, all under Convoys of Men of War.

Feb. 17. The Right Hon. Mr. Secretary Pitt is so much indisposed, that he could not attend the House of Commons Yesterday; therefore some Business of Consequence that was expected to have come on, was postponed.

It is said that the Number of Prisoners in the different Goals in England, at the least Computation, amounted to near 60,000.

Feb. 21. The Master of a Vessel who was taken and carried into Bayonne, is just come Home in a Cartel Ship from thence, and says, that there are belonging to that Port and St. Juan de Luz, sixty Sail of Privateers, and when he came away, there were near forty of them at Sea, some of which cruise to the Westward of the Western-Islands: He further says, that several Spaniards and Portuguese were come there to purchase English Vessels, but that an Order was come from Court not to sell any of them but to their own People.

The Assistance Man of War of 50 Guns, and the Aldborough of 20, are appointed Convoys to the Trade bound to Virginia and Maryland. The said Men of War are to bring the Trade home.

The Nettleton, Reid, from Virginia to London, is taken by the Duc de Gramont Privateer of Bayonne.

Admiralty-Office, Jan. 30. Captain Elphinstone, Commander of his Majesty's Ship the Richmond, of 32 Guns, and 220 Men, being on a Cruise upon the Coast of Flanders, received Intelligence the 23d Inst. of a French Frigate which had the Day before taken and ransomed the Dorothy and Ether, William Benson, Master. Captain Elphinstone immediately went in Quest of her, and fell in with her about Eleven o'Clock, the same Night. She bore down upon the Richmond for a short Time after being in Sight, but then suddenly hauling her Wind, endeavoured to get away. Captain Elphinstone pursued, and came up with her about Half past Ten o'Clock the next Morning, when they began to engage, standing towards the Land; and at Half past Twelve, both Ships ran ashore along Side of each other, still continuing the Engagement for a short Time, when the Enemy fled from their Quarters. The Richmond soon afterwards got on Float, and being drove by the Tide a little to Leeward, the Enemy quitted their Ship, and escaped, but the Ship is entirely destroyed. The French Frigate was called the Felicite, and carried 32 Guns, was bound to Martinico, with a Cargo valued at 30,000 l. Sterling. Her Consort the Har-

monie, another French Frigate, of the same Force and Value, was lost coming out of Dunkirk. Captain Donell, Commander of the Felicite, was killed in the Engagement, and near 200 others of the Enemy were killed or wounded. The Richmond had only 3 Men killed and 13 wounded.

March 3. The last Letters from Spain speak positively, that a Treaty between the Courts of London, Madrid, and Turin, is actually concluded; and that, by Virtue of it, his Catholic Majesty has ordered some of his Troops to file off towards Barcelona, to embark there for Italy.

March 7. A Mail will be made up and dispatched from the Post-Office the 14th Instant, for New-York, by the Halifax Packet Boat, Captain Boulderston.

NEW-YORK, April 29.

Captain Finglas, from London, sailed from Spithead the 12th of March, in Company with Captain Ouchterlony, for this Port, Captain Hooper for Boston, and several others for Carolina and Virginia, under Convoys of his Majesty's Ship Success, Captain Hamilton, of 20 Guns, bound for South-Carolina: He parted with Captain Ouchterlony about five Weeks ago, at West-Indies; and last Week, to the Westward of Bermuda, he spoke with three Letter of Marque Brigs from Virginia, bound to the West-Indies.

Captain Finglas says, that the Day before he sailed from Spithead, the Admirals Hawke and Hardy arrived there from Quiberon-Bay, and brought in with them several Prizes, some of them Privateer Ships, several Lug-sail Cruizers, and a Sloop from Martinico with Sugars: That the Channel was very well cleared of French Privateers, Numbers of them having been lately taken by our Frigates: That the Fleet was still at Spithead, and the Troops in their Quarters in different Parts of England.

Thursday the 16th Instant was sent in here, by the Privateer Brig Mars, Captain M'Gillycuddy, the Snow La Fortune, Captain Chrest, taken the 16th of March, from the Grenades, bound for Marfeilles, in Old France. Her Cargo consists of Sugar and Coffee, and is esteemed a valuable Prize.

PHILADELPHIA, May 7.

In a Letter from London, by Captain Lane, there is the following Paragraph: "The Grand Expedition, which had been laid aside for some Time past, is now going forward again; the young King continues to give great Satisfaction; the War is still to be pushed on in Germany; the Parliament is to be dissolved the 19th of March; the same Unanimity continues; and as the French seem obstinate, we are resolved to see them cut, rather than give up the Advantages we have gained."

The Transports, from New-York, left Sandy Hook on Sunday last.

ANNAPOLIS, May 14.

Yesterday arrived here Captain Charles Courtney, in the Ship Sally of Whitehaven, in 24 Days from St. Kitts; but brings no News. There was no Talk there of any Expedition against Martinica.

We hear from Somerset, that Mr. John Adams is Elected a Representative for that County, in the room of Major Henry Waggaman, Deceased.

From St. Mary's we hear, that the Negro Man who Murder'd Mrs. Booth, her Child, and the Negro Wench, has been Tried, and Condemn'd.
