**P A R I S,** January 1761.  
**THE** War in Germany will Summer with such Vigorous Campaigns will appear but a Broglie's Army will amount Men, and Soubise's to 50 or 60,000 Oxen for the Subistence of our Forces.

**L O N D O N.**  
Jan. 17. Last Week as much Woollen and mounted to the Value of 95 l. was distributed to poor People that received no Alms of the Poor Law.

Jan. 18. The Will of John Smith, who died near the War Department, died at Versailles on the 7th. It is not yet known who will succeed him.

Jan. 19. Yesterday came Advice that the Minister and Secretary of State to the War Department, died at Versailles on the 7th. It is not yet known who will succeed him.

There are said to be two Persons in Trade that have Orders for Goods of different Sorts for the Amount of 32,000 l.

Eight of the twenty Gun Frigates that are completed in the King's Yards, it is said, will be the Beginning of next Month. They are intended for the French Privateers.

It is now said that an Expedition against the River Mississippi, will soon take Place, and a speedy Stop will doubtless be put to the Back of Carolina.

The Crews of the French Privateers taken are found to consist nearly in a Proportion of Foreigners, especially Spaniards and Portuguese, by the Prospect of Gain and the uncommon Enemy have had, flock to France in Shoals.

Extra of a Letter from Paris, Jan. 1761.  
From the Measures that are taking for the Campaign, it seems impossible that the Enemy can blow that are meditating against them. But Projects, we know not what to think of the Spanish. Our Court are justly afraid that they should divide their Forces, and send some Troops towards Italy. The King of Spain, instead of the adjusting of the Affairs of Italy, as we general Peace, seems determined to avail himself of the present Embarrassment. Our Court are well informed of his Intentions, and are endeavouring to gain England to favour his Cause.

The Austrian Claims in Italy. This Affair gives great Anxiety in the present Situation of the Court were in Expectation, by continuing little longer, to be able to dictate Peace on their own Terms, and to reverse the Fortune of the late War. The following is an authentic List of War to be armed this Spring, by Order of Majesty, dated Buen Retiro, Jan. 6, 1761.

At CARTHAGENA, Nine Ships of the Line, three Frigates, four Bombs, one Fireship, and one Provision Ship.

At CADIZ, Thirteen Ships of the Line, three Frigates, two Hospitals, and two Provision Ships. On Monday last 400 Quarters of Wheat Measure, and 1400 Gallons of Corn Spirits for Navigation were entered for Exportation.

Yesterday 6000 Gallons of Corn Spirits were exported to Quebec; and 4272 Beaver, 34791 Deer, 380 Otter, and 41 Wolves Skins, from Quebec.
