

for which gallant Action, we hear, the Insurers in London made them a Present of an 8th Part of the Vessel and Cargo.

We hear from Hull, that there is an Island in the River Humber, called Cherry Cob, now grown so considerable, that the Government has taken Cognizance of it, and commissioned the Mayor, and other Gentlemen of Repute in the Neighbourhood, to view and estimate the Value, in order to grant a Lease thereof. It is found to contain upwards of 2500 Acres of good Grass Land, ready for embanking, valued at about 600 l. at present, and at above 1100 l. a Year when embanked. It lies further up the River than Sunk-Hill, the Level higher, and will be less Charge in embanking.

CHARLES-TOWN, South-Carolina, April 11.

Extract of a Letter from Ninety-Six, dated the 5th Instant.

“Last Night arrived here Timothy Rarden (late one of the Fort Loudoun Garrison) Express from Fort Prince George, with Dispatches from the Commandant there, to his Hon. the Lieut. Governor, &c. Our Accounts from thence are, that 47 more Prisoners have been purchased from and delivered up by the Cherokees, 36 of them Soldiers, making in all 67 since Captain McIntosh has been there.—That Talks to and from the Nation were frequent, from and to the Fort, those from the Indians in a pacific Strain; and from the Fort, adapted to the present Circumstances of Affairs. That the young Warrior of Estatoowib was returned from his Incursion to Long-Canes, &c. with such Plenty of Cattle, as enabled him to spare 23 of them, which he sold and delivered for the Use of the Garrison (Some Letters say he made a Present of them to Captain McIntosh as a Proof of his Desire of Reconciliation). That he pretended he had been down as far as Ninety-Six, and seen many White People, but did not offer to molest one, although he could have killed them at Pleasure, and that he was sorry for what had happened, but looked upon the Path to be now straight again, and hoped it would remain so. That amongst other Things, he said, he found that the Nation had given out he was the Cause of the War's Continuance, but they were as much to blame as himself.—That the Want of Provisions had made a great Part of the Nation desirous of a speedy Accommodation; and their Eagerness to procure some Clothing was what had induced them so readily to give them up their Prisoners, and (together with the Difficulty of finding them Subsistence) would influence them to bring in the Rest soon. For further Particulars I must refer you to the Express, not having Time to enlarge.—We expect Major Moultrie here in two Days, and are making proper Provision for him. There are some Whispers here about Peace; but believe, at least here, there is no Foundation for them, and that the Cherokees will first receive the proper Reward for their Perfidy and Cruelty.”

We hear, that the regular Troops at Munch's Corner, were to march forward from thence as this Day.—The Highlanders which Colonel Grant sent for from Providence, are returned to Town in Order to embark forthwith for New-York, whither General Amherst has ordered them. Near 77 Sick, of the Independents, came to Town at the same Time.

BOSTON, April 27.

We hear that the Honourable House of Representatives, in their last Sessions, hath made Provision, for Captain Saunders, in the Province Sloop, to convey John Winthrop, Esq; Hollisian Professor of Mathematicks and Philosophy at the College in Cambridge, with the Apparatus and other Necessaries, in said Sloop, to the North East Part of Newfoundland, or to such other Place as said Professor shall think proper, in order to observe the Transit of Venus over the Sun's Disk, on the 6th of June next; and when his Observations are completed, to attend and convey him back to Boston.

May 4. Tuesday last came to Town from Plymouth, Captain Emerson, late of the Ship Neptune, who informs, that he sailed in said Ship from Piscataqua, about 5 Weeks ago, bound for the West-Indies; that, after being out eight Days, he was taken by a Letter of Marque Polacco, bound from Port-au-Prince to Marfeilles. The Frenchman sent the Ship to Port-au-Prince.—That on the 5th of April, in Lat. 36: 55, Long. 45: 15, the Polacco also met with and took the Brig Stork, Captain Cotton, from Cadiz, bound to Plymouth, who, after detaining him three Days, and plundering him to a considerable Value, taking his Arms from him, and throwing his Cannon overboard, gave him the Privilege to ransom, as they had but 31 Men on board, and could not spare any to carry her into Port; upon which Captain Cotton thought proper to comply with their Terms, which was 1000 l. Sterling. The Polacco was called the Victore, Joseph Beveft, Commander, richly laden with Indigo, Sugar, &c.—Captain Emerson, and his People (except five) were put on board Captain Cotton's Vessel, and arrived at Plymouth about ten Days since.

On Monday last arrived here Capt. John Andrews, in the Brig Catharine, from the West-Indies, and informs, that on the 11th ult. in Lat. 24: 30, Long. 71, he was taken by a French Privateer from the Cape, commanded by Martin Arnauld, with about 20 Men, and some Cannon and Swivels.—Captain Andrews ransomed his Vessel for 700 l. Sterling.

NEW-YORK, May 11.
Wednesday last Captain Deal arrived here in 7 Weeks and 3 Days from Cadiz, but brings no remarkable News. The Spaniards are somewhat stricter than usual in examining the English Vessels that enter their Ports, not allowing any to break Bulk, till they have been searched, and have produced their Manifests, and Officers are kept on board while Vessels are loading.

On the 23d of April Captain Ouchterlony, in Lat. 30: 34, Long. 64: 12, fell in with a French Privateer Sloop, of 10 Guns, who fired several Shot at him, but as soon as he began to play his 6 Pounds upon her, she thought proper to make the best of her Way.—Captain Ingalls, lately arrived from London, was chased by a Sloop much in the same Latitude.

Saturday last his Majesty's Ship the Fowey, Capt. Tonyn, sailed for England, and took under Convoy several Merchantmen bound to the Eastward. CHRISTOPHER KILBY, Esq; Agent Victualler, is gone home Passenger in the Fowey.

PHILADELPHIA, May 14.

The Rebecca, Captain Stewart, from this Port for Charles-Town, in South-Carolina, was lost as she was going over the Bar into that Place.

A Gentleman wrote from Wilmington on Tuesday last, That he was just arrived there in the Schooner Success, Captain Flint, from St. Christophers, who, on his Passage, was taken by a Brig of 16 Guns, and ransomed for 2000 Dollars: That there was a Frigate of 40, and a Sloop of 12 Guns, in Company with the Brig: And that they sailed with a Fleet of about 50 Sail of Vessels, 22 of which for North America, a Number of them thought to be taken, as Captain Flint's Vessel made the fifth Prize that was known of; one of which Captain Flower of this Port, from St. Christophers, taken by the Frigate and ransomed for One Hundred and Seventy-five Pounds Sterling.

The Snow Friendship, Captain Urie, from this Place for Barbados, is taken, and carried into Martinico.—The French Privateers are still very numerous among the Islands, and take many Vessels, notwithstanding the Diligence of Commodore Douglas, who we hear, has his Ships always at Sea.

ANNAPOLIS, May 21.

On Monday last Week, two very valuable Slaves, who were Fishing at the Falls of Patowmack, were, by a sudden Fresh, wash'd from the Rocks and Drowned.

Yesterday Capt. Pitt, in the Molly, arrived here in eight Days from Boston, but brings no News.
