L O N D O N, March
HIS Majesty's most gracious Speech to Parliament, on Thursday the 19th 1761.

My LORDS and GENTLEMEN,
I CANNOT put an End to this Speech, declaring my entire Satisfaction in your Conduct during the Course of it. The Zeal you show for the Honour of my Crown, as well as the Interest, and that of your Country, is the same, is the clearest Demonstration of your Affection to my Person and Government, and has unanimously assured me at your first Meeting, that you would add to the Pleasure which I receive from me, as that I am now able to acquaint you with the Progress made of late by the Combined Armies, under the Command of Prince Ferdinand. I formerly told you, That the Nature of those Parts, had kept the Campaign there for some time, and the Surprise of my Army, and the Superior Ability, and indefatigable Activity of the Spirit and Ardour of my Officers, have greatly profited of this Perseverance, and have overcome the Difficulties arising from the Season. By your Assistance, I have taken the best Advantage of my Fleet, for next Summer, to advantageously defend my Kingdoms; protect my Subjects; maintain and extend our Acquisitions; and annoy the Enemy. As in all my Measures I have nothing in view but the Security and Felicity of my Dominions, the Liberties, and the restoring of the public Tranquillity, and the Divine Providence, to give a happy Issue to my Operations.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,
I cannot sufficiently thank you for your Unanimity, in providing for the Expenses of my Government, and the Honour and Dignity of the Crown, which I think myself as much obliged to you, for the Advice, in framing that Provision, you have given me, to leave my own Hereditary Revenues to the Disposal of Parliament, as might best conduce to the Satisfaction of the Public, as for what more concerns myself.

In making my Acknowledgments for the late Supplies which you have granted me this Session, I am obliged to you, for your Advice, and your Wisdom in proportioning them to the Occasions of the Public, notwithstanding the common Burthens, which I heartily regret. I am desirous, on my Part, to see them duly applied to the national Ends for which you intended them.

My Lords and Gentlemen,
The Expiration of this Parliament now draws near, and I must therefore give the necessary Orders for the Dissolution of it. But I cannot take my Leave of you, without expressing my Thanks for the many eminent Proofs of your Fidelity and Affection to my Family and Government, and of your Zeal for this happy and glorious Situation.

During this Parliament, the Flame of War, kindled by the injurious Encroachments and Usurpations of the late King, and therefore it became just and necessary, to prosecute it. In the Prosecution of it you have given me the most valuable Assistance, and your Royal Grandfather and myself, and such of our Allies, as have manifested your public Spirit for the Honour of the Nation; and the Maintenance of the Rights and Possessions, and been the glorious Successes, and great Acquisitions, in the Course of it, particularly the entire Reduction of a Conquest of the utmost Importance to the Colonies in North-America, and to the Extension of Commerce and Navigation of my Subjects.

May God Almighty grant Continuance to the Successes of my Arms, and the Continuance of the Peace, which I propose to make of them, in order to promote the Welfare of my Kingdoms, and to secure the Peace, on safe and honourable Conditions for my Allies; to which I have been always ready to consent. Firm in these Resolutions, I do, with entire Confidence, rely on the good Dispositions of my faithful Subjects, and I make no Doubt, that they will thereby demonstrate the Sincerity of their Choice of their Representatives; and I make no Doubt, that they will demonstrate the Sincerity of their Choice, which have been so cordially and universally approved in the loyal, affectionate, and unanimous Address.

Then the Lord Chancellor, by his Majesty's Command, My Lords and Gentlemen,
I have his Majesty's Royal Will and Pleasure, that the same be read on Tuesday the seventh next, to be then here held; and this Parliament prorogued to Tuesday the seventh Day of April next.
